CALIFORNIA CROP IS VERY PROMISING

Peaches and Grapes are in Particularly Good Condition—Bartlett Pears May Be Short.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., April 19.—A circular regarding the 1910 deciduous fruit crop of the state, issued by one of the local distributing firms, says:

"While it is yet too early to give any positive information in regard to the coming crop of fruit in this state, we can at least give an idea as to how it appears at the present time. In this state trees bloom all through March and the setting of the crop is entirely dependent upon weather conditions. With one or two exceptions these conditions have been exceedingly favorable during the present season. There has been but one rain and there is every reason to believe that nearly all varieties will produce satisfactory crops and many of them will undoubtedly be very heavy. After the fruit sets there is a period of uncertainty in regard to the percentage that will remain on the trees and reach maturity. We have not yet reached the end of this doubtful period and it will be at least ten days more before anything can be stated with certainty.

"Cherries—There is considerable complaint in regard to Black Tartarians and general reports indicate that this variety will be rather light. Chapman and Advance are fairly good, Black Republican and Bing are heavy. Royal Ann are somewhat spotted, being a heavy crop in some places and very light in others. In all probability they will average a fair crop.

"Plums and prunes generally promise a very satisfactory crop, with the possible exception of Tragedy, which are reported as light in some sections. "Peaches promise a full crop in all sections.

"Bartlett pears—This variety is not expected to make as large a crop as last season. A good crop, however, is expected.

"Grapes—Vines are just now starting their young growth. Nothing can be predicted as to the coming crop except to say that all conditions are favorable.

"More attention has been paid to pruning and spraying this year than for a number of seasons past as growers are thoroughly awake to the fact that their fruit must be of good quality in order to find a profitable market.

"Thinning has now commenced in the early sections and will receive greater attention than ever before.

HEAVY APPLES RECEIPTS.

Cooler Weather, However, Creates Good Demand in New York.

NEW YORK, April 19.—The first two days of this week there were 65 cars of York state apples received on the docks here, exceptionally heavy for April. Notwithstanding the liberal supply the demand is much improved, due to the cooler weather. The heavy receipts are cleaning up well.

Baldwins are taking the lead at \$3.50 @ 4.25. Other quotations are: Greenings, \$3 @ 4.50; Spys, \$3.50 @ 4.50; Ben Davis, \$3 @ 3.50; and Russets, \$2.50 @ 3.

Receipts of box apples are considerably heavier and the trade is shifting from berries to boxes. Colorado Ben Davis and Gano are bringing \$1.50 to \$1.85, Missouri Pippins \$1.85 to \$2.25, Winesaps \$2 to \$2.50 and Rome Beauties \$2 to \$2.25. Higher grade Washington and Oregon apples sell according to their condition at prices generally around \$2 to \$3.50.

The trade with foreign markets is at an end owing to the new crop of Australian fruit which is supplying European centers.
