## BIG UNIVERSITY PLANNED FOR BRITISH COLUMBIA

VICTORIA, B. C., April 20.—A commission named by the government is today working on general plans and considering a site for a provincial university for British Columbia, intended to rank second to none in the world.

On the commission, whose plans are to be final, are Dr. Henry S. Pritchett of New York, president of the Carnegie foundation; Dr. Weldon of Dalhousie university, Nova Scotia; Canon Duthie of Laval university, Quebec; Dr. Skelton, professor of physical science at Queen's university, Kingston, and Principal Murray of the University of Saskatchewan.

The university is to be located in either Victoria, Vancouver or New Westminster.
