## WOMAN WHO KILLED HUSBAND IS ACQUITTED

MOSCOW, Idaho, April 22.—"Not guilty" was the verdict of the jury in the case against Mrs. Laura E. Loftus, who admitted she shot her husband last December with a double-barreled shotgun, near Troy, this county, after a violent quarrel.

Mrs. Loftus lived with her husband on a farm. According to testimony adduced at the trial, the couple had many quarrels and on the night of the killing Loftus returned from town and threw his wife out of the cabin. She returned to the house, seized a shot gun and killed Loftus as he stood in the doorway. The plea of the defense was temporary insanity.

## INVESTIGATING DEATH OF EIGHT-YEAR OLD BOY

SAN JOSE, Cal., April 22.—An investigation is under way today to ascertain who is responsible for the death of 8-year-old Harold W. Tansey, who was caught beneath a six-ton steam roller yesterday and crushed to death.

The roller was being used to smooth the surface of West Third street between San Antonio and San Carlos.

The lad was riding behind the roller on a velocipede. He was directly behind the roller when the engineer reached the end of the pavement and reversed his engine and caught the boy under the immense rollers.

## VASSAR COLLEGE SORE AT CANDY CONCERN

KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 22.—Vassar college today is plaintiff in a court action to restrain the Loose-Wiles Candy company from using the word Vassar on a certain brand of its chocolates. The particular objection of the college trustees is the picture of a college girl adorning the box, in imitation of the Vassar seal, over the figure the words "Vassar Chocolates" were substituted for "Vassar College," while beneath it, where the college motto, "Purity and Wisdom," appears with the slogan "Always Fresh." The complaint recites that the words "Always Fresh" appear to be applicable to the female figure above them.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 22.—Prosecutor Conkling announced today that he had discovered enough connection between the disappearance of the notes of the grand jury in the Swope murder case and their possession by the attorneys for Dr. B. C. Hyde, the defendant, to warrant a grand jury investigation.

Mrs. Pearl Kellar, Colonel Swope's nurse, whose testimony is strongly for the prosecution, continued on the witness stand today. After finishing her direct testimony she was severely cross-examined by attorneys for the defense. Her story was apparently unshaken by the ordeal.

## Death of W. H. Shaffer.

W. H. Shaffer died at his residence at 1215 East Main, Friday morning, aged 58 years, 7 months and 4 days. Mr. Shaffer came here from North Dakota two years ago with his family.

The arrangements for the funeral have been postponed until relatives in North Dakota can be heard from.
