AMERICAN GIRL KILLED IN NAPLES

Body Is Washed Ashore by Waters of Bay—Motive for Crime Said to Be More Sinister Than That of Robbery.

NAPLES, Italy, April 25.—The police are convinced that Miss Estelle Reid, the American girl whose half dressed body was washed ashore in the bay of Naples yesterday, was the victim of a desperado, who attacked her while she was walking in the country alone.

The fact that a gold chain about her neck and her body was marked leads to the belief that the motive for her death was more sinister than robbery.

The girl, who was about 20 years of age, was a guest at the Hotel Castella. The management of the hostelry knows little about her.

She came to Naples from Germany, where she had been traveling during the winter, it has been learned.

CHICAGO, Ill., April 25.—Mrs. John Blair, the wife of John Blair, an actor, was prostrated today when she heard of the murder in Naples of a girl she believes is her sister, Miss Estelle Reid.

When she was informed of the European dispatches Mrs. Blair went into hysterics. She was taken to her apartments and physicians were called to quiet her.

TAGGERT AFTER JOB IN SENATE

Democratic National Committeeman Formally Announces His Candidacy—Much Surprise at the Announcement.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., April 25.—Thomas Taggart, Democratic national committeeman, has formally announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for the United States senate. After a silence which caused various political conjectures, Taggart made his announcement at French Lick. "I will be a candidate for the Democratic nomination for United States senate under any circumstances," he said. "In the event that the coming state convention decides to take the matter up and makes the nomination, I will go before the convention as an aspirant for the nomination. In the event the convention leaves the matter to the next legislature I will be a candidate for the honor then."

Local Democrats attach much significance to Taggart's announcement. Taggart men assert that Taggart has assured himself that he will prevent state delegates from adopting the senatorial selection plan which is being formulated.
