

WILL MOVE THE TOWN OF EAGLE POINT

REPORTED THAT NEW LOCATION IS PICKED OUT

Pacific & Eastern Railroad Will Build Depot on High Lands Two Miles From Present Site and Will Aid Moving Town to New Location—Lumber Yards Established.

ALLEN PLANS TO MAKE CITY A "HALLEY'S COMET"

Natural Advantages of New Site Is Pointed Out—Allen Says He Will Give Free Lot to Every Person Who Will Move There.

The town of Eagle Point is to be moved some two miles from its present location to the higher land overlooking the present site, if the plans of the Pacific & Eastern railroad do not miscarry.

The Mail Tribune has learned from a reliable source that the Pacific & Eastern railway has definitely decided to establish its permanent station at Eagle Point about two miles north of the old temporary depot and a new and commodious depot, strictly up to date, will be at once erected at the new location.

For some months John R. Allen, president of the Pacific & Eastern railroad, has been working quietly on this matter and it is now reported that lumber yards have already been established at the new townsite and brick kilns will also be burned nearby.

Already several business houses of Eagle Point have declared their intention of moving to the new town and the project has revived the hopes of the residents of Sam's Valley for obtaining a county bridge, which is very much needed, across Rogue river at some suitable point between the Bybes bridge and the present ferry, thus enabling them to reach the railroad.

The advantages of the new townsite are many fold. The famous orchards of the Apple Kings of the World are only a mile distant, and many other famous orchard lands are nearby.

The situation is ideal. A most beautiful view of Mount McLaughlin and many other beautiful and high mountain peaks may be obtained. Allen says nature has done her part and he expects to do the rest and make the new town of Eagle Point the "Halley's Comet" on the map of Jackson county.

The light and power for the new town, it is reported, will be generated in the old Holmes mill, in the present town of Eagle Point.

John R. Allen, president of the Pacific & Eastern, when asked about the matter, said:

"It became apparent to us last winter that the location of our station at Eagle Point had been unwisely selected on account of the land being black sticky; also on account of a small creek that traversed the station grounds. After considerable thought on the subject and the inspection of all available points we decided to move the station about two miles northward, where the ground is of the 'desert quality' and the elevation being the highest of any point in the neighborhood and admirably adapted for providing an excellent sewerage system. CLEVER WOMEN TRAP MANY WHITE SLAVES

Two College Graduates Pass Themselves as Immoral Women and Catch Many White Slavers in Net.

NEW YORK, April 30.—Additional warrants will be issued today for men and women suspected of connection with the white slave traffic following the arrest of Bell Moore, a negro, here, last night; Harry Levinson, 20, white, and Alexander Anderson, a negro.

The warrants are the result of the investigation of the special grand jury, of which John D. Rockefeller, Jr., is the foreman, and which has been investigating the white slave traffic.

The evidence warranting the arrests was secured by two young college women, one 40 years of age, a graduate of Radcliffe, and the other a young graduate of Smith college. Their names have been withheld because their work has not yet been completed. Both of these women will appear at the trials and testify against the alleged white-slavers.

One of these women went to Alaska, the other to Seattle. They became friendly with the proprietors of illegal resorts, pretending that they wanted to buy women for immoral purposes. They secured the names of alleged white slave dealers in New York.

The identity of the persons to be arrested today has been withheld pending the arrests.

IF OUSTED, CANNON PREDICTS DEADLOCK

Democrats' Insistence on Election of Clark Would Have Let the Country Know What It Does Not Know.

BOSTON, Mass., April 30.—"Wicked Czar Cannon still presides over the deliberations of the greatest legislative body on earth, but his actions amount to nothing unless made vital by a majority of the representatives," declared Speaker Joe Cannon here today.

Explaining why the insurgents did not oust him, Cannon said: "My opinion is that if a small minority of the majority had united with the Democrats and declared the speakership vacant, Democrats would have insisted on the election of Champ Clark. WATER PROBLEM TO BE SETTLED

City and Hanley Getting Together on Long-Contested Points — William Hanley Takes a Hand and Fast Unraveling Knots—Does Much in One Day.

PARTIES AWAIT ARRIVAL OF ATTORNEY FROM NORTH

Believed That Question Will Be Thrashed Out Monday and Trouble Ended—Petition Circulated Asking Council to Act.

At last there seems to be a rift in the war clouds which have long hovered over the Hanley premises on Little Butte creek in connection with the right of way the city is seeking for the gravity water system. The parties are fast getting together and it was believed that on Monday Hanley will submit a proposition to the city.

The man who is responsible in a great measure for the unraveling of the tangle is William Hanley of Burns, Or., who came in and got the city in closer touch with M. F. Hanley.

The matter is now awaiting the arrival of an attorney from Portland who represents the Rogue River Canal company, successors to the Fish Lake Ditch company. He will arrive Monday morning and it is believed that Hanley will be in a position to submit a definite proposition.

The matter now rests between the Rogue River Canal company and Hanley. An endeavor is being made to settle the water rights in Little Butte creek, once and for all. This will leave Hanley in a position to make a proposition to the city.

Citizens of Medford are almost unanimous in their desire to have the question settled. A petition was circulated Saturday asking the city council to take steps to decide the matter. The petition was signed by nearly every person approached, showing how unanimous the sentiment for an early settlement is.

ENGLISH ACTRESS TO WED GRADUATE OF HARVARD

NEW YORK, April 30.—According to friends of Miss Beatrice Forbes-Robertson, the English actress, has announced her engagement to Swinburne Hale, a graduate of Harvard law school, who is practicing in Chicago.

The young attorney they say met the actress at a suffragist's meeting in London at which she delivered an address. It is rumored that they were engaged before Hale returned to the United States.

Miss Forbes-Robertson will not give up the stage, nor abandon her efforts in behalf of votes for women after her marriage. She is an open exponent of the suffrage cause but has never identified herself with the militant English element.

GIRL FALLS FROM THEATER BALCONY AND IS KILLED

NEW YORK, April 30.—Fourteen-year-old Louise Loffer is dying at the Flower Hospital from injuries sustained when she fell from the balcony of the Lincoln Square Theatre into the orchestra pit, 30 feet below.

The girl was walking down the aisle toward her seat in the first row of the balcony and stumbled. She fell against the brass balcony rail, which gave way and precipitated her into the body of the theatre.

MIDDLE WEST CROP IS LOST

Missouri Nursery Man Writes N. S. Bennett That All Hope for a Fruit Crop in Middle Western States Was Wiped Out by Recent Terrific Blizzard.

NEVER BEFORE DID THAT SECTION SUFFER SO SEVERELY

Means High Prices for Rogue River Fruit During Coming Season — Great Area Was Hit by Heavy Blizzard.

The entire fruit crop of the middle west has been destroyed by the recent blizzard which swept over that section and in consequence top prices are insured for the Rogue River valley during the coming season. Once again has the superiority of the Oregon fruit sections been demonstrated.

Confirmation of the great damage done to fruit in the middle west comes in a recent letter from the New Haven Nurseries of Missouri to N. S. Bennett of this city. The letter says:

"The entire fruit crop in this part of the middle west is utterly destroyed. Apples, peaches, pears and grapes throughout the entire middle west, as far west as Kansas City, as far east as Cincinnati, as far south as the Ozarks, and north to the Minnesota line, including central and eastern Iowa, eastern Missouri, Illinois, western Indiana and northern Kentucky, Southern Missouri, so far as we can learn, is not affected below the Ozarks. We had temperature here yesterday morning of 25 above zero, and the thermometer stood for 48 hours below freezing, and with apples the size of hazel nuts, peaches about the same, and cherries ditto, you can see the result. We have never seen such complete destruction. Just what the result will be to the nursery, we are unable to tell at this writing. We had 500,000 peach seedlings up, and these seem to be dead to the ground. The peach buds, however, are not as bad as we had feared. They seem to have been less tender, but they stood from six to twelve inches in height, and while they seem to be wilted, they may make good trees. The two-year pear had grown from three to eight inches, new heads, and we will probably have to cut the mbank to the ground and make into strong cut-back whips. We are giving you this full information, as it may be worth something to you to know it. We cannot learn that the Kansas nurseries have been seriously hurt. The freeze was not as severe there as here. We had several inches of snow, but now same is about gone. When we tell you that we have had summer weather for the past six weeks, you can understand what this blizzard has done for us. The native nuts and native fruit, such as pawpaw, persimmons, blackberries, etc., are complete loss; in fact, the condition is one never before known in this section of the country. We have had frosts, but this was a 48-hour blizzard."

Will Double That of Josephine County, According to Conservative Estimates—Taps Klamath and Lake

Jackson county will lead all Southern Oregon in population this year, according to the present indications. It is estimated that the county's population will range between 30,000 and 35,000 inhabitants.

GRANTS PASS, April 30.—A conservative estimate of the population, according to the census enumerators, is 16,000.

KLAMATH FALLS, April 30.—According to a conservative estimate the present census will show 3600 inhabitants of this city and the county 9000.

LAKEVIEW, April 30.—The population of this city is estimated at 1500, while that of the county will be in the neighborhood of 4000.

BREWERS WILL BE TIED UP BY STRIKE

Workers Ask for new wage Schedule Which Association Refuses—Believe 800 Will Go Out on Monday.

SEATTLE, Wash., April 30.—Fourteen breweries, including every big beer manufacturing plant on Puget sound, will be tied by a strike of from 700 to 800 members of the United Brewery union Monday.

The contracts between the brewery owners' association, which represents breweries of Seattle, Tacoma, Olympia, Aberdeen, Everett, Bellingham, Port Townsend and Port Angeles, and the brewery workers' executive officers.

The brewery workers ask for a new wage schedule which the association refuses.

Wrestling Match Stopped.

CHICAGO, Ill., April 30.—Jesse Westergard was thrown heavily to the floor after fifty-one minutes wrestling with Stanislaus Zbysko last night. He sustained a badly twisted ligament and Referee Fleming stopped the match.

FIGHTER IS SLAIN; BIG MILL MAY BE STOPPED AS RESULT

Tommy McCarthy Dies Following a Knockout Blow by Owen Moran in San Francisco Prize Ring—Tragic Ending of Battle May Stop Jeffries-Johnson Fight.

OPPOSITION TO BIG MILL CRYSTALIZED BY TRAGEDY

General Gloom Prevails in Sporting World—McCarthy Was Popular—Death-Dealing Blow Came in Sixteenth Round After Hard Fight.

The following prize ring fatalities have occurred within the last 11 days: April 19—Young George Cole, negro, Merchantville, N. Y., died in Presbyterian hospital, as the result of a prize fight with Stanley Rogers. Fight was a slug-fight match, ending in knockout. April 21—Max Landy, Boston, died following prize-fight with Joe O'Brien, Cambridge. Fight had ended in a draw. April 30—Tommy McCarthy, San Francisco, died in St. Mary's hospital, San Francisco, following knockout in 16th round of fight with Owen Moran of England at Dreamland rink, San Francisco, previous night.

—There is gloom in the sporting world today. The death of Tommy McCarthy, one of the cleverest and best-liked little boxers in local fighting circles, following the fight in which he expected to climb a long way up the pugilistic ladder, has thrown a pall of sadness over the fight followers.

Wherever fighters and fight fans gather today, the death of McCarthy is the subject of conversation.

Many fight followers were in court today when the preliminary hearings of the men arrested in connection with McCarthy's death began.

Weeps in Court.

Owen Moran, the English fighter, whose stinging right sent McCarthy to the mat and ended in his death, broke down and wept openly in court.

All through the night Moran prayed that the life of his game little opponent might be saved.

All those arrested were brought before Judge Conlan today. Johnny and Willie McCarthy, brothers of Tommy, were released on their own recognizance. The court directed that their father bring them into court Wednesday, when the preliminary hearing will be held.

Moran, Perry, Carroll and Bernard Painter were released on bail.

Blow on Jaw.

After lingering in unconsciousness from the time he was struck down by Owen Moran, the fighter, Tommy McCarthy died at 3:23 o'clock this morning of a fractured skull.

McCarthy died at St. Mary's hospital. He was felled by a blow on the jaw delivered by Moran in the 16th round of their fight last night at Dreamland rink.
