## LITTLE FALL IN PRICE OF BEEF

Light Supply of Legs Warranted Higher Prices Despite Tumble Throughout the East.

PORTLAND, Or., May 2.—Receipts on this market for the past week have been as follows: Cattle 1614, calves 67, hogs 1834, sheep 1130 and horses 2.

There has been little or no change in prices since our last report. The top on the hog market is \$6.50, as compared with \$9.65 at eastern points, and sheep have sold at higher prices than during the temporary set of market two weeks ago.

There has not been the fall in prices that was expected on the cattle market and while there is no doubt that the price for grass cattle will be lower than for hay fed, good quality steers and cows are in demand at a high range of prices.

The light supply of legs from the territory tributary to Portland has warranted higher prices despite the tumble of the markets east.

Good quality sheep sold well and the seeming change in the market is due more to class and condition than to ascending values.

## DR. BROUGHER LEADS ATTACK ON MAUD ALLEN

Says Men and Women Will Go to See Her Dance Merely Advertise Their Own Indecency.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 2.—Maud Allen is under the ban of Los Angeles clergy today following a denunciation of her dances by Rev. J. Whitecomb Brougher from the stage upon which she performed before hundreds of Los Angeles people.

Dr. Brougher is the pastor of the Temple Baptist church. He fills the pastorate formerly occupied by Dr. Robert J. Burdette, the services of the church being held in the auditorium, where Miss Allen appeared.

"Impurity is sand in the eye," he said. "Not long ago a young woman appeared on this stage, advertised to revive the art of dancing as known by the ancient Greeks.

"There were many things the ancient Greeks had that we don't need now. She also danced a Salome dance, the one which Theodore Roosevelt refused recently in France to witness. I wish we had more men like Roosevelt. Men and women go to see such dances merely to advertise their own indecency. Some of them will go in their own impure ways until they bump against Hades and get some of it knocked out of them."

**Big Brewer Dead.**  
SEATTLE, Wash., May 2.—Andrew Hemrich, president of the Seattle Brewing and Malting Company, and one of the best known owners on the coast, died in the Minor Hospital here early today.

Two weeks ago Hemrich went to Soap Lake, suffering from acute bladder trouble. Yesterday morning he lost consciousness and was rushed here on a special train reaching Seattle at 2:30 o'clock this morning. He died two hours after reaching the hospital.

**Tigers Lose Mascot.**  
DETROIT, Mich., May 2.—The Detroit Tigers are mourning the loss of their mascot, "Teddy," Wild Bill Donovan's pet bull terrier. "Teddy" lost his life under a street car, while out walking for exercise with Mrs. Donovan. Tiger fans say the dog committed suicide and that his "rag act" followed prolonged grieving over Detroit's failure to win the world's series last year. Members of the team stoutly deny this. They declare death was "accidental."

## COWS HELP SOME; HENS FALL DOWN

Butter Down to 30 Cents, While Eggs Make Advance—Many Vegetables Are in Market.

Local bovines are doing their duty now by the consumer, while the hens are a little shy on production.

Butter has dropped from 37½ cents for ranch to 30 cents, while creamery is now on the same plane with the ranch at 30 cents, while eggs have raised from 20 cents to 25 cents. This is owing to the fact that when the family idea gets into a hen's head she absolutely refuses to do anything but "set" on anything, no matter what, but that matter will be remedied in a short time. At that, 25-cent fresh eggs are better than 40-cent storage ones and the market is pretty well supplied.

Local vegetables, radishes, lettuce, onions, etc., are in good supply and reasonable in price.

California strawberries are being offered and are in good demand.

The local strawberry crop has been held back somewhat by cool weather, but within the next ten days there will be plenty of berries of local production in the market.
