

JACK PRICE BLOWS OUT HIS BRAINS

In His Shack Near Leland Is Found Gambling Devices—Reported He Recently Gambled in This City.

GRANTS PASS, Or., May 4.—Sunday morning Jack Price committed suicide in his cabin about nine miles from Leland, in this county, by shooting himself with a revolver. Price was about 35 years old and was known as a gambler by occupation, but had a mining claim on Grays creek, where he went to rest after a season of gambling. He was last seen alive last Tuesday morning, and Sunday morning, while John Young was passing the cabin, he called, and receiving no answer, looked in the window, and saw Price lying on the bed with the top of his head shot off. Price had purchased the revolver from Young about two weeks ago.

No reason can be given for the crime, as Price had about three months' stock of provisions on hand and \$49 in cash. Before committing suicide he had dressed himself in his best clothes, which were of the finest make. Among his effects were the various holdout devices of the gambler, and his coat had pockets in the sleeves for hold cards. Nothing is known about any relatives, and the coroner instructed that the body be buried in the vicinity.

During the winter months Price would disappear from this locality and go to places where gambling was carried on, and it is said that he won quite a sum at Medford only a short time ago.

SIEVER'S BIG GLOVE HELPS PERMOLL WIN

DETROIT, May 4.—Henry Houston Pernoll, who is known to ball players and fans as "Bud," pitched for the ill-fated Aberdeen club last year. Eddie Siever, formerly a southpaw on the pay roll of the Detroit club, was a member of the same organization. The day that Pernoll received information that Detroit had secured him, he told Siever about it. Siever pulled off a big infielder's glove. "I congratulate you," remarked Siever, and handed Pernoll the glove. "You've always wanted this, it's yours. It's a big fellow and the best glove I ever wore when they drive them at you up there in Detroit; just grab them and remember Siever."

The Browns failed to rattle Pernoll by sending the ball at him. He fielded clean. The big glove helped him.

ATLANTA, Ga. May 4.—The warden of the federal prison here today received hundreds of requests from convicts in the prison for permission to write a note of appreciation to Miss Geraldine Farrar, the well known grand opera singer who sang before the felons in the prison theater yesterday afternoon. Miss Farrar probably received more applause during the afternoon than ever offered her by a audience of civilians.

Suiting her songs to the majority of her listeners, she selected a number of simple English ballads. There were large numbers of prisoners present who would have appreciated grand opera more, however. Among those who heard her were Charles W. Morse, the convicted "ice king," Green, Gaynor and Lupo, the "Wolf," who became notorious on account of his connection with the Italian Black Hand.

Miss Farrar was accompanied to the prison by Anton Scotti, but Scotti did not sing.

BICYCLISTS MUST KEEP OFF THE SIDE WALKS

Ordinance Prohibiting Riding on the Walks in City Will Be Rigidly Enforced.

Hereafter the ordinance prohibiting the riding of bicycles on the sidewalks anywhere within the city limits will be rigidly enforced. Lately the law has been allowed to be non-observed in certain districts, but the many narrow escapes from accidents and the recklessness of the riders has caused a resolve on the part of the city authorities to enforce the law.

There are only two exceptions to this ordinance, i. e., mail carriers and persons who are crippled.

Mayor Canon said: "We have not fined any of the violators of the ordinance yet, but have simply warned them. Hereafter, however, the penalty will be inflicted."
