CALIFORNIA PEARS WILL NOT BE LARGE

Fruit, However, Is Maturing Nicely and Is Said to Be Without Blemish and Splendid Quality.

The California fruit distributors of Sacramento have issued the following letter to the fruit growers of California:

Since the shipment of the first car of cherries on April 29 nine cars of this fruit have gone forward from the state, these shipments being made from the Suisun, Winters, Vacaville, Sacramento River and Placer County districts. Cherries from the San Jose district will be ready for shipment in about ten days, at the end of which time car lots from that point will begin to go forward.

The quality this season is all that could be desired, the cool weather up until the middle of this week staving the fruit nicely.

Apples, plums, prunes, peaches, are as last reported, no adverse conditions to the maturing of these fruits can now be anticipated.

Bartlett Pears—While as previously advised, the crop of this fruit will not be large, there will be sufficient for all ordinary shipping purposes. Fruit on trees is maturing nicely, and is without a blemish, promising a quality which will be hard to surpass.

Grapes—Indications are for a normal yield. The bunches are now forming, and unless something unforeseen happens during the period of blossoming there will be an unusually large percentage of big bunches suitable for cluster packing.

Climate conditions continue to be normal, the weather has turned several degrees warmer, and we look for a continuation of standard fruit ripening weather.

SAYS LEOPOLD GAVE BONDS TO BARONESS

BRUSSELS, May 9.—In an open letter published here, M. Van der Velde, the Socialist leader in the chamber of deputies, charges that the late King Leopold, on the day before he underwent his final operation, turned over to Baroness Vaughan \$6,000,000 worth of Congo bonds, which could not be found when the Congo was annexed to Belgium. The transaction was made through Baron Snoy, commandant of the royal household, acting under instructions from the king.

PORTLAND BUYING CALIFORNIA STOCK

Run of Grass Cattle From Oregon Has Not Started—Hog Market Is Slowly Coming Down Out of Sky.

PORTLAND, Ore., May 19.—Receipts on this market for the week ending today have been: Cattle, 1,484; calves, 92; hogs, 1,071; sheep, 4,090; horses and mules, 52.

Most of the cattle have been from California and were of good quality and the prices at which they were sold indicate that the lower prices the supply, both in quantity and looked for at this time did not apply. The run of grass cattle has not started and while the packers undoubtedly expect to get lower priced cattle quality has not warranted a reduction.

The sheep market has been well supplied throughout the week. Prices indicate a steady market. There were all sorts of sheep offered and the lowest priced quoted in the sales which follow brought all they were worth.

The hog market is slowly following the lead of the rover market and while prices at Portland are \$1.50 per hundred higher than at other points and market is 10c lower than last week.
