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PREPARING TO RUSH ROAD WORK

Railroad Contractors Flock Into Bend to Begin Work on Extension of the Oregon Trunk Line to the Reservation.

BEND, Ore., May 11.—Railroad contractors are flocking into Bend preparatory to beginning the first work on the extension of the Oregon Trunk from Madras to the Klamath Indian reservation.

M. McFee, one of the members of the firm of Henry & McFee, to which firm the entire contract for the 125 mile extension into Klamath county was let the last of April, reached here a few days ago and has since been making an extended investigation of the country through which the southern portion of the line will pass.

While the district from Crooked River, through Bend and western Crook county is some of the easiest country, from a physical standpoint, in which road building will be pursued, at the same time the contractors now on the ground expect to encounter no little difficulty and handicaps owing to the distance from the base of supplies.

Bend is 100 miles from Shaniko, the terminus of the Columbia Southern, and that is the nearest point from which material can be brought into the interior by rail. The balance of the distance into this section must be traversed by freight teams. In addition to this, Shaniko is overflowing with every conceivable kind of freight, adding another obstacle in the matter of speedy delivery of construction material.

CARPENTERS UNEARTH SOME ANCIENT LETTERS

While tearing away the front of the Freeman building on the corner of Front and Pine streets, the fore-part of this week, the carpenters uncovered some old letters that were mailed 19 years ago when the building was used as a postoffice. There were four letters and one postal card. The card was written by J. H. Gay of this city and was addressed to William Mayfield, city marshal at Astoria, Or. The letters were addressed to different parts of the United States and as the names of the senders are not on them, Postmaster Tex will send them to the dead letter office. Three of the letters bore Columbian stamps, issued at the time of the World's fair in Chicago in 1893.

The letters had fallen through an opening in the wall at the letter box. The building was occupied as a post-office when the late H. H. Magruder was postmaster.—Central Point Globe.

HEAVY HAIL FELL AROUND ROSEBURG

Considerable Damage Was Done in City by Hail—Over 100 Street Light Globes Were Shattered—Skylights Break, Letting Water In.

The storm which visited the Rogue River valley Monday afternoon was evidently much heavier to the north, reaching its climax at Roseburg, according to the following dispatch from that city Tuesday:

Roseburg last evening was visited by hailstones in some cases nearly as large as walnuts. Hail fell to a depth of four inches inside of ten minutes. Flower and truck gardens were ruined, 103 street lamps and many windows were shattered, some outbuildings were wrecked or moved several feet and small trees, billboards and fences were blown down. The interior of buildings equipped with skylights were damaged and one firm lost in this way \$1,500 worth of millinery. Street drains and sewers were clogged and in some places miniature rivers ran over the sidewalks. A large tree on an island in the Umpqua was split by lightning. Had as the storm was, it fortunately was confined to the city, else outlying orchards and strawberry patches would have been ruined.

OFFICERS SUSPECT WITNESS HAS BEEN SPIRITED AWAY

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., May 11.—Sheriff John Smith of Sonoma county has come to San Francisco in search of Luella Smith, who claims Dr. Willard P. Burke of Santa Rosa is the father of her child, and who is the leading witness against him in the charge of attempting to kill her with dynamite.

The Sonoma county officials suspect that the woman has been spirited away. After a week of futile searching District Attorney Lea sent Sheriff Smith to San Francisco to enlist the aid of the police of this city in finding the woman, and communications have been sent to every police department of the state.

Miss Smith disappeared a week ago from the home of W. F. File at Berkeley, where she was staying pending the trial of Dr. Burke. It has been learned that she was visited by strangers on several occasions shortly before she left.
