CARNEGIE LIBRARY AWAITS RETURN OF CITY'S 1910 CENSUS

John R. Allen gives it as his opin-
ion that after the present federal
census is reported Medford will have
excellent prospects of obtaining a
donation from Mr. Carnegie. The
stumbling block in the past seems
due to the fact that the census of
1900 gave Medford's population as
1791, while the count in 1909 showed
something less than 6000, thus mak-
ing it appear to the Carnegie library
board that the amount asked for,
\$20,000, was out of proportion to the
population. The returns of the cen-
sus now being taken will no doubt
create a more favorable impression.
Mr. Allen's conclusions are based
on a personal interview which he had
with Mr. Carnegie's secretary during
his recent trip east.

as the old tickets. If this subject is
brought to the notice of the dairy-
men and sanitary tickets demanded
by their customers, no doubt they
will be as willing as was my dairy-
man to make the change, while every
customer must feel more confidence
in every improved or sanitary meas-
ure.
