## MEXICANS MUST WEAR TROUSERS IN SEPTEMBER

Government Issues Instructions to Peons to Provide Themselves With Pants for Great Centennial Celebration in September.

MEXICO CITY, Mex., May 17.—The Mexican peon will have to wear pants during the great centennial celebration here next September. The governor of the federal district has issued instructions that breeches must be worn by even the humblest of the race.

A plan for providing the peons with pants to replace the loose-fitting white cotton garments generally in evidence has been devised. If a man is too poor to buy a pair of pants he will be given employment a sufficient length of time to enable him to accumulate the required amount.

The government is anxious that everything look spick and span during celebration month, and with that end in view is leaving nothing undone. Hence the interest in pants for peons.

In this tropical climate peons wear white pantaloons, loose-fitting. They are far from being neat in appearance. Some of the men wear their white garments rolled up to the knees. To the tourist they appear typical and to some perhaps picturesque. At any rate, they have to go, at least during next September.

## COLORADO FRUIT PROSPECTS GOOD

Frost Damage in Colorado and Utah Has Curtailed the Crop, But the Northwest Will Likely Exceed 1909

GRAND JUNCTION, Colo., May 17.—A summary of western fruit prospects has been compiled by the Grand Junction News as follows:

Colorado—Colorado's crop will average even better than the record-breaking crop of 1909, according to the information now obtainable. And it must be remembered that in 1909 Colorado shipped more fruit than all the western fruit states combined, California alone excepted. Even in the districts most seriously affected by frost this year in Colorado the crop will be only slightly below last year's output, while in many sections, where the fruit was most hurt last year, there is a full crop for 1910. Between 6000 and 7000 cars of apples were shipped last year from Colorado, besides peaches, pears and other fruits. Fully that much fruit will be shipped in 1910, unless present estimates prove altogether misleading.

Utah—It is difficult to secure an estimate for the state of Utah as a whole. The damage caused by this year's frost was very streaked. Some sections were hard hit; some were scarcely touched. Says J. Edward Taylor, state horticultural inspector, in a letter dated May 4: "There has been considerable damage to fruit crops in particular sections in Utah, but the damage is very streaked, and it is hard at this time to get accurate information. From Ogden north they will have a full crop, and from Ogden south they will have from 40 to 75 per cent of a crop, depending upon location."

Idaho—Idaho, Utah and Colorado were injured more by the 1910 frosts than were Washington and Oregon. From what reports are available Idaho, however, suffered less this year than did Utah and Colorado, and, in place of the almost total failure throughout the state last year, will have not far from a full crop for 1910. J. R. Field of Boise, the state horticultural inspector, reports that, whereas in 1909 there was but 20 per cent of a crop, there will be a 95 per cent crop for 1910, taking the state as a whole. His estimate of the shipments for the entire state for 1910 is: Apples, 1700 cars; peaches, 100 cars; prunes, 700 cars; total, 2500 cars.

Washington and Oregon—The situation for these two states is sufficiently summed up in the following short letter from E. H. Shepherd of Hood River, publisher of Berry Fruit, and the recognized authority for conditions in the northwest: "The crops throughout the northwest of all varieties of fruit promise to be good, somewhat larger than last year, on account of increased acreage."
