## CROP OF CHERRIES SHORT THIS SEASON

Cause Attributed to Late Frost in the Willamette Valley—Quality Better, However, Than Last Year

PORTLAND, May 18.—That the Willamette Valley cherry crop this season will be far below the average is the statement of H. M. Williamson, secretary of the state board of horticulture.

"Blight and late frosts," said Mr. Williamson this morning, "have caused a great shortage in the quantity of cherries throughout the Willamette valley. Theoyal Ann variety in particular will be considerably short. The Lamberts and Black Republicans will be somewhat more plentiful."

"There will be enough cherries, however, to supply the home markets. Being thinner on the trees, they will be a better quality than usual. There probably will not be many to ship out. The scarcity of the crop, however, will make the prices better, and the growers will realize about as heavy profits as usual."

"The ten-acre Webb Lambert cherry orchard near Fairview, the most important Lambert cherry orchard in the state, will have a fair crop, although not as heavy as last year and the year before. The quality of the cherries in this orchard will be even better this year than usual."

"Caterpillars seem to be causing considerable trouble this spring in the prune and apple orchards. In Eastern Multnomah county they are particularly abundant, and are causing the farmers considerable annoyance. The way to get rid of these insects is to apply poison or kill them by the means of a kerosene torch, when they gather in bunches on the branches of the trees in the morning. The best way is to kill the larvae of the worms on the twigs before they hatch out in the spring."
