GOVERNOR ONCE; NOW NO CITIZEN

Ex-Executive of New Hampshire Shorn of His Citizenship When He Pleaded Guilty to Attempting to Defraud the Government.

NEW YORK, May 21.—Ex-Governor Frank West Rollins, of New Hampshire, was shorn of his citizenship when he pleaded guilty to the charge of attempting to defraud the government of customs duties, according to a statement by Federal Attorney Wise today. To regain it he must obtain a pardon from the president of the United States.

Rollins was indicted by the federal grand jury for failing to inform the New York customs officers that he brought clothing and other articles from Europe valued at \$4736. He appeared in the United States circuit court yesterday and pleaded guilty to the charge. Judge Hand fined him \$2,000 which he promptly paid.

Mrs. Rollins and Douglas Rollins were included in the original complaint but the federal grand jury returned an indictment against the ex-governor alone.

The maximum penalty for the offense is \$500 fine and two years imprisonment.

It Wise construes the law correctly, ex-Governor Rollins is not a citizen of the United States.

No trace of the child's parents has been found. He is unable to tell where he lives or give any information, but says his name is "Wally."

The boy was seen by residents of the section of the city near the ball park and Policeman Atwater was notified. He took the boy over to the chief's and he will remain there until cared for.

TRAVERSE CITY, Mich., May 21.—Ad Wolgast, champion lightweight pugilist, in an automobile, collided with a horse bearing Miss Kathleen Slater, 12, daughter of a prominent business man here. The girl's hip was injured when she fell to the pavement.

Wolgast took her in his machine to Slater's home. Three men were

with Wolgast in the machine at the time of the accident. Slater declared that he would not sue Wolgast for damages, as he considered that the pugilist's money was ill-gotten.
