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COUNTESS GIVEN JAIL SENTENCE

Noted Murder Trial in Venice Ends in Conviction and Three of Accused Parties Begin Doing Time-- Duke of Abruzzi Interested in Case

VENICE, May 21.—Convicted of a murder conspiracy that started a Europe, Countess Maria Tarnowska, Dr. Naumoff and Lancer Nicholas Prilukoff today began serving prison terms for killing G. Count Komarowsky. The countess and physician were sentenced to three and eight years respectively, while Prilukoff received ten years. The jury found that Countess Tarnowska and Dr. Naumoff were not fully responsible for their acts. Elise Perrier, the maid, was acquitted. The case excited the interest of all Europe. Not alone were its criminal features striking, but the political question involved furnished food for gossip in court circles. Had the murder and trial occurred in Russia little of the details probably would have become known. Occurring in Italy, the Russian social and political system was laid bare in spite of every effort of the czar's agents to hush up the case. These efforts were made at the beginning of the investigation and would have been successful had not Italian newspaper men become aware of the fact. The Italian police were placed on their mettle and could not aid the czar in suppressing the ugly scandal. The Tarnowska murder trial was pending for weeks. It ably attracted greater attention than any case of the kind in Italy's criminal history. The Duke of Abruzzi, Mme. Rejan, the actress, and D'Annunzio, the well-known aviator, were among the spectators, only a few among the well-known persons who attended the hearings. Of the four prisoners, Countess Maria Tarnowska, though only charged with instigating and not with actually committing the murder of Count Paul Komarowsky two and a half years ago, was the central figure in the case. The next conspicuous figure was Dr. Naumoff, 21, who admitted having fired the fatal shots. Nicholas Prilukoff, a lawyer, and Elise Perrier, the countess' maid, were accused as accessories.

SUBMARINE RUNS 487 MILES ALONE

ANNAPOLIS, Md., May 21.—That submarines are capable of making cruises of 200 miles and more from the coast, accomplishing their work and returning to their harbor was demonstrated on the trip of the Cuttlefish, Viper and Tarantula from Charleston to the naval academy. The Viper, commanded by Midshipman Lee P. Warren, ran 487 miles without help of any kind from any source. The voyage was taken after the torpedo which bored the Viper and Tarantula to the Prairie had parted. This occurred off Cape Lookout, North Carolina, and the Viper had no difficulty in reaching Annapolis from that point. Naval people say that the achievements of the submarines, particularly of the Viper, are epoch making in that line, and will make our coasts wonderfully secure from hostile ships, none daring to approach within 200 miles.

GREEK THOUGHT END OF WORLD NEAR, GAVE UP COIN

CHICAGO, Ill., May 21.—Somewhere on the west side a pious Greek peddler named Christ Chekos is brooding an influence toward the propitiary that impelled him to cast his bank account to the winds to a crowd last night and prepare himself to pass from the world without worldly goods, according to the approved Carnegian theory. Certain that the comet would snuff his life, Chekos last evening drew his deposits from his bank and stationed himself at the intersection of Chicago and North avenues. After announcing to those who would stop to listen that he intended to pauperize himself before the comet struck, he hurled handfuls of nickels and quarters among the scrambling crowd. After heaving his last dime into the eager mob he disappeared to await the end of the world.

STREAMS IN TEXAS SWOLLEN BY DELUGE

DALLAS, Tex., May 21.—Every stream in Southern Texas is swollen

to the overflowing point today as a result of 48 hours of heavy rain. The damage to crops is estimated at half a million dollars. At Middleton the 11-year-old son of J. L. Mouse was killed by lightning and three persons were injured. Fifteen dwellings were destroyed at Sour Lake, many were damaged and 25 oil derricks were blown down by a wind that accompanied the rain. San Antonio suffered from the storm and crops in that portion of the state were damaged.
