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CATTLE MARKET STILL STRONG

In Face of Liberal Supply, Demand at Portland Keeps Up—Sheep Market Lowers Steadily—Hog Prices Steady at Last Week's Closing.

NORTH PORTLAND, Or., May 23.—Receipts for the week ending today have been: Cattle, 2244, calves 84, hogs 1063, and sheep 6160.

In the face of the liberal supply of cattle the market has remained surprisingly strong. A loss of from 10 to 15 per cent per hundred on the week is light, especially in view of the arrival of grass cattle. The bulk of the arrivals are from California and in point of quality they ruled better than the usual offerings from east of the Cascade mountains. The readjustment of prices expected because of the difference in California hay fed and Oregon grass cattle cannot be said to have taken place.

The sheep market has lowered steadily and the wide variation shown in prices has been due to a like condition in the quality of the offerings. There has been a fair demand at the lower prices.

The hog market shows increased supplies from local territory and prices are about steady at last week's closing. Tops have brought \$10.55, the bulk of the sales running to \$10.50.

RECORD FRUIT CROP IN INLAND EMPIRE

Mills Working Day and Night Turning Out 10,000,000 Each of Apple, Peach and Cherry Boxes.

SPOKANE, Wash., May 23.—Mills in Spokane and throughout the Inland Empire are working day and night on apple, peach, cherry, plum and berry boxes, more than 10,000,000 of which each holding 50 pounds, will be required to pack the fruit crop in eastern Washington and Oregon, north and central Idaho, western Montana and southeastern British Columbia the coming summer and fall. Packed with fruit, these packages would fill 15,675 freight cars, or 625 trains of 25 cars each. The value of the crop is estimated at from \$15,000,000 to \$20,000,000, and may reach a higher figure because of the shortages reported in middle western states.

Fully 3,000,000 boxes will be delivered to orchardists in the Wenatchee valley in central Washington and it is predicted that not less than 2,500,000 boxes will be used in the Yakima valley. Walla Walla and Okanogan valleys will take up to 1,500,000 boxes, while the berry and tree fruit growers in the upper Columbia country say their orchards will run at least 500,000 boxes. A million boxes will be delivered in the Palouse district in southeastern Washington and western Idaho, the Blue mountain country and the Spokane and St. Maries valleys and other nearby points. Other belts in Washington and Oregon have orders in for 1,500,000 boxes.

Reports from the fruit belts in the Clearwater country, in northern Idaho, and the Bitter Root country in western Montana are that the outlook is bright for record yields of apples and other fruits and predictions are made that the apple crop this year will be the largest in the history of the country, all that records will be made in peaches and cherries. Growers in the southeastern part of the province of British Columbia report that every indication is that the apple crop will be larger this year than ever before in the history of the industry.

MANY CARS OF FRUIT SHIPPED

California Distributors Report Forty-one Cars of Cherries and Two of Apricots—Bartlett Pears 40 Be Average Crop in Golden State.

The California Fruit Distributors under date of May 21 say:

The following gives number of cars of deciduous fruit shipped to all points by all members of this company for the week (seven days) ending Friday night, May 20.

Cherries—27 cars, making a total of 41 cars from the state to date. Late cherries are going forward from the early sections and the earlier varieties are now being forwarded in carload lots from San Jose, shipments there having commenced about the middle of the week. The quality of the fruit continues fine.

The first 16 cars of cherries shipped by us grossed \$65,350, or over \$4000 per car.

Apricots—Two cars. Although the report on this variety shows that the carlot movement has begun, it is not the case, however, that any straight cars of other varieties than cherries have yet gone forward. A number of cherry cars shipped out during the last week have contained a small percentage of this fruit, which during this time has aggregated the total just given. Cool weather has retarded the development of this fruit, but with a change in the conditions fairly liberal quantities can be expected to go forward next.

Plums have been shipped in small quantities for the past six days. Movement of this variety will cut very little figure, however, for another week when Clymans should begin moving in fairly liberal quantities. The plum crop was injured somewhat in the early sections last week by a severe wind which blew off considerable fruit. It is not expected, however, that it will affect the total output noticeably. Plums, prunes and peaches continue to look well and are developing in very satisfactory shape.

Bartlett pears—Nothing further to report on this crop. Fruit is growing nicely and will probably make about an average crop as reported last week.

Grapes show no change, but continue in very satisfactory condition. Weather during the past week has been generally cool and pleasant. With the exception of the heavy wind reported above there have been no adverse conditions prevailing. Warm weather would accelerate the ripening of our fruits and be generally acceptable.
