OREGON INVITING TO STRANGERS

Hill Visit Attracts Unusual Attention

—Webster Campaign for Good Roads—State Never Looked Better Than at Present.

PORTLAND, Or., May 26.—Never did Oregon look so clean, spick and span as at the present time. Eastern and central Oregon have had rains at just exactly the right time. Western and southern Oregon are intensely prosperous, and the carpenter, cabinet maker, painter, designer, landscape artist and busy housewife have had more than they could do in every section, for the disposition to clean up and paint up and put the best foot foremost was never more contagious than at the present time.

The good roads campaign now being conducted by Judge Lionel R. Webster throughout Oregon is not only attracting an unusual amount of newspaper comment, but the judge is convincing his large audiences that only in Multnomah county can direct taxation be depended upon for good roads through Portland's heavy tax contribution, and that long time bonds issued are about the only way to get good roads during the lifetime of the present generation throughout the state at large. A constitutional amendment will be required to bring this about.

The trip through Oregon by President Louis W. Hill of the Great Northern railway has probably occasioned a greater amount of newspaper comment in the papers of the state than has been accorded the visit of any other man during the last ten years. Mr. Hill's entrance into central Oregon from Shaniko was somewhat arduous, as he started immediately after the hardest rain for 12 months, which has resulted in making some of the roads almost impassable, but he was determined to see all there was to see, and his personal discomfort was never mentioned. In every place he had something definite and decisive to say. His visit has served as a tremendous encouragement to those interested in the development of Oregon.

UNIQUE DISPLAYS FOR WORLD'S APPLE SHOW

SPOKANE, Wash., May 26.—Distinctively unique will be the third National Apple Show in Spokane the week of November 14, when between \$25,000 and \$30,000 is to be distributed in prizes and trophies in competitions open to the world. The prize winning exhibits and special displays from fruit districts in Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana will be transported to Chicago by fast trains and exhibited in the First Regiment armory the week of November 28. The cost of the two shows is estimated at \$77,000. E. F. Cartier Van Dessel, chairman of the board of trustees of the National Apple Show, Inc., headed by Howard Elliott, president of the Northern Pacific Railway company, says that fully 2,000,000 apples will be displayed at the Spokane show; also that about 12 cars of the best fruit grown in the northwest will be on exhibition in Chicago. This display will include at least six entries in the carload classes, in which the sweepstakes will be worth \$1100, each car containing 620 boxes. R. H. Rice will manage both shows.

Taft Again President of Unitarian League

BOSTON, Mass., May 26.—President Taft today entered upon another term as honorary president of the National League of Unitarian Laymen. In his letter accepting the position to which he was elected, he said that responsibility devolves upon the laymen of all churches to uphold the religious and ethical principles for which the church stands, and apply these principles to the solution of the civic, social and industrial problems confronting the country.

70 OF 116 PASS COUNTY EXAM'S

Highest Percentage Was Made by Miss Hazel Beebe of Agate, With an Average of 94.8—Miss Sylvia Kelley Is Second.

Out of 116 applicants in the county eighth grade examination which have just been completed, 70 passed in all subjects and were awarded diplomas. Many others passed in all but one or two subjects, and under the rules governing such examinations they will be allowed to rewrite upon these subjects at the June examination, and if successful, will be awarded diplomas then. Those who failed in more than two subjects will be required to take the whole examination again.

The highest percentage was made by Miss Hazel Beebe of the Agate school, who had an average of 94.8 per cent. Miss Sylvia Kelley of the Willow Springs school was a close second with 94.5 per cent. Miss Almada Orr of the Agate school and Miss Hazel Rick of the Savage Creek school tied for third place, each having an average of 94.2 per cent.
