THE OLIVER MEETINGS

The attendance at the Oliver meeting last night was larger than for some time. It is to be hoped that the weather is settled again and that nothing will interfere with the attendance during the closing days of the meeting. It has been unfortunate that the roof of the tabernacle did not protect the audience from the rain that has been so abundant since the meetings began. The music last evening was especially inspiring.

The text of the evangelist was taken from Luke xii:8-9, "Every one who shall confess me before men, him shall the son of man also confess before the angels of God; but he that denieth me in the presence of men shall be denied in the presence of the angels of God."

Dr. Oliver introduced his sermon by saying that the chief reason why men do not confess Christ is the fear of losing favor with their fellow men in business, politics or society. But no one can afford to sell out his eternal interests for the applause of men or the wealth of this world. "Ye cannot serve God and Mammon."

There is a distinct dividing line between the world and the church of Jesus Christ, and there is no neutral ground to occupy. "He that is not for me is against me" is the declaration of Scripture. Sometimes we hear men say that they are brothers-in-law to the church. There is no such relation. You are either in the kingdom of God or you are in the kingdom of satan.

Sin is rebellion against God. The sinner is not simply a weakling or an unfortunate, but a transgressor of the laws of God by deliberate choice. God's laws, whether physical, mental or moral, are inexorable, and he who violates them must sooner or later suffer the penalty.

Sin is anarchy, and every one who is living a life of rebellion against God is doing all, as far as his power and influence extends, to destroy the government of high heaven.

The moralist who prides himself on his morality and declares that he can get along without God is as much an enemy against the church as the most loathsome drunkard that wallows in the street, and his influence on the young is much more dangerous.

And lastly, the sinner is an ingrate. Ingratitude is one of the basest and most contemptible sins of the human heart.

The man who is constantly receiving the blessings of life and health and all the advantages of a Christian civilization and never stops to thank the giver of every good and perfect gift has certainly descended in his moral degeneracy to the level of the beast. On the other hand, gratitude is one of the choicest of all the Christian graces, and is esteemed by all people of refinement and is well pleasing to God.

The subject for tonight is one of great interest to many people. "The Lodge and the Church" will be the theme for the evening. All are cordially invited.

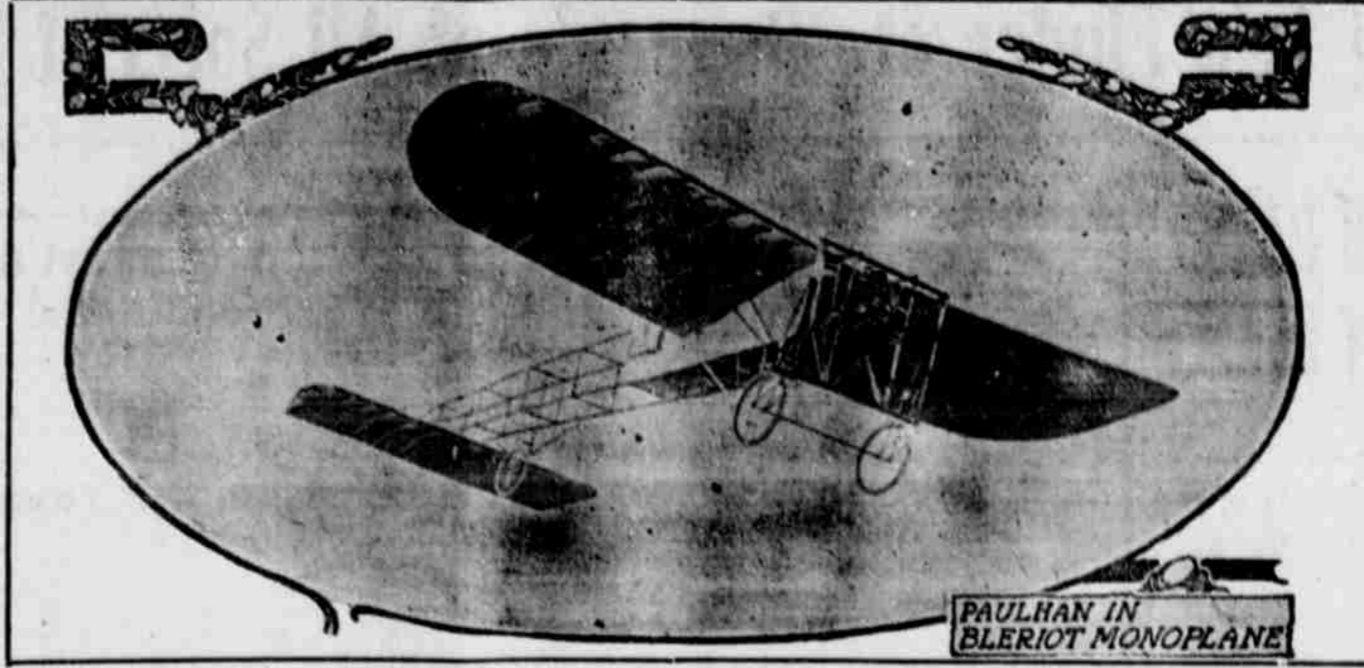
SEYLER ACQUITTED OF MURDERING SWEETHEART

PATTON QUILTS STOCK EXCHANGE

CHICAGO, May 26.—That James A. Patton, the wheat king, will retire from business permanently July 1 was the authoritative announcement made today to the United Press.

The fact that Patton's previous announcements of proposed retirement have been followed by coups in the market is causing his opponents to wonder what new grain option he is planning to corner.

Patton said that he intended to rest during the summer and to go to Europe next fall. He admitted that he might trade a bit "just for amusement," after discontinuing active operations.

The speculator announced a new million dollar corporation to be known as Bartlett, Frasier and company, which would succeed to the business of Bartlett, Patton and company.

ATTEMPT TO IMPUGN MOTIVES OF SPITZER
