NO MONEY FOR ROUTE

Senator Chamberlain States That Appropriation for Rural Delivery Is Exhausted, and This Is Reason of Holdup of Medford Routes.

In regard to the rural free delivery route from Medford to Eagle Point, which has been under discussion for some time, and which was recently gone over by a government inspector, Senator George A. Chamberlain writes as follows to the Mail Tribune:

"I beg to acknowledge receipt of your favor of the 9th instant. In reply, permit me to say that I immediately called the attention of the fourth assistant postmaster-general to the petition for rural free delivery route No. 2, from Medford, Or., which had been approved by the postoffice inspector, designated to investigate the matter, and recommended that the proposed route be established immediately. The assistant postmaster-general promised to give the matter his immediate attention and advise me by letter as to the action of the department in the premises. In accordance with his promise, he writes me today as follows:

"You are advised that, while a favorable report on the route in question has been received, owing to the existing condition of the finances of the government and the consequent necessity for strict economy in all branches of the public service, it is deemed advisable, after careful consideration, to defer further installation of rural delivery for the present, except where necessary to maintain the efficiency of the service in operation or where the establishment of new service seems imperatively required to meet demands which cannot be met by means of existing facilities."

"In view of this report, I am afraid that there is little or no chance of obtaining favorable action by the department in the matter at this time. You may rest assured, however, that I will not discontinue my efforts to get favorable action in the matter, and after the lapse of a reasonable time I will again call the attention of the department to the subject."

JEFFRIES VISITS FRISCO TONIGHT

Big Fellow to Give Exhibition at Dreamland Pavilion. Attired in Regulation Fighting Costume—Will Take On Choyanski.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 27.—Jim Jeffries will arrive from Rowdennan at 9 o'clock tonight and will be hustled from the depot to Dreamland pavilion in an automobile. The big fellow is scheduled to begin his exhibition at 10 o'clock, so he will barely have time to make the trip and get into his ring togs.

To give the fans every opportunity of getting a line on his condition, Jeffries will appear in the ring attired in regulation fighting costume. He will discard the athletic pants and shirt that he usually wears while at work in the gymnasium, and trunks, shoes and socks will constitute his apparel. After going through the gymnasium stunts Jeffries will take on Choyanski and Jack Jeffries for three rounds each. There will be no rests between the different forms of exercise, nor between bouts, as the champion is anxious to show that the reports of his wonderful wind have not been exaggerated.

NELSON CHALLENGES WOLGAST TO FIGHT

NEW YORK, May 27.—Fearing that James J. Jeffries cannot fulfill "the hope of the white race," if he continues his present methods of training, John DL Sullivan, the veteran fighter and ex-champion, who arrived here today after his honeymoon trip in Europe, said he will go to California to give Jeffries some free advice.

Sullivan is peeved at the miscellaneous collection of "decripts" with which Jeffries has surrounded himself, and said he intended to do his share toward aiding Jeffries by advising the retired champion to stop vacation methods and secure the services of younger men.

"I would be a joke if I went to California to polish Jeffries off, but at that I bet I could trim that bunch of mis-fits at Rowdennan," said John L. today.
