

# ASHLAND PAYS INTERSECTIONS

### Initiative Petitions Put in Circulation for Bond Issue of Thirty Thousand to Provide Fund for Municipal Improvement.

ASHLAND, Or., May 28.—Initiative petitions were put in circulation in Ashland today, at the instigation of the city council, demanding that ordinances be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at a special election to be held July 2, which authorize the issuance of \$30,000 6 per cent ten-year street bonds for the purpose of paving the street intersections in certain proposed paving improvements of North Main street, East Main street, the boulevard, Oak street, First avenue and B street, and also the issue of \$25,000 electric light bonds, bearing 5 per cent interest, to run for 20 years and optional after ten years, to provide money for the completion of the city's electric light plant, work on which was suspended about a year ago.

The proceeds of the first issue of bonds for the electric light plant, amounting to \$80,000, was expended and it was found after a survey of the work done, by an electrical expert, that between \$20,000 and \$25,000 additional would be required to put the plant in operation. Most of the money will be required in completing the distributing system.

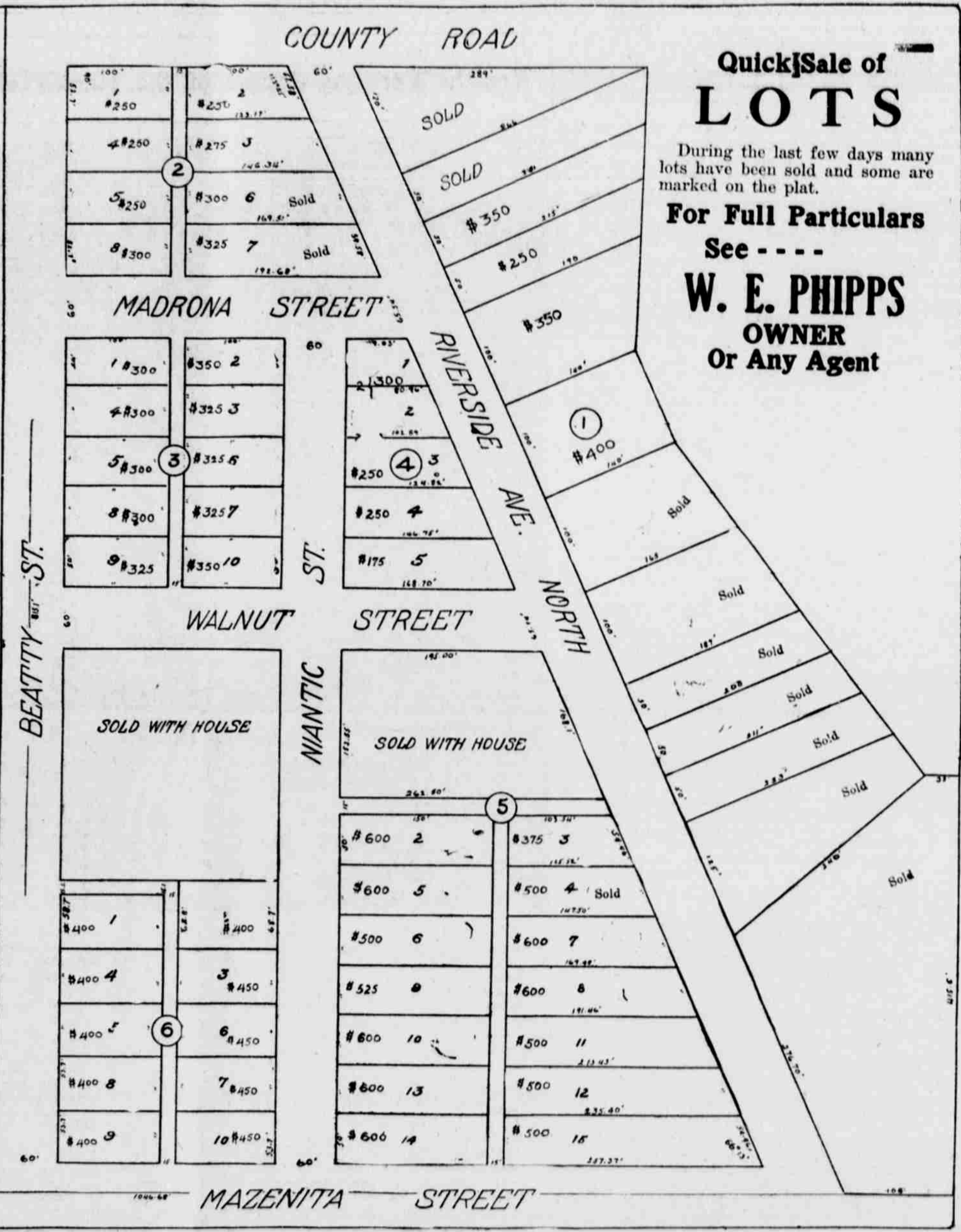
