**ACCUSED OF SELLING MORTGAGED HORSES**

**Warrant Issued at Ashland for the Arrest of A. L. Benson at Instance of Jack Moore.**

ASHLAND, Or., May 28.—A warrant was issued in the justice's court here yesterday for A. L. Benson upon complaint of Jack Moore of Klamath Falls, accusing him of larceny by bailee of two bay horses.

Benson formerly kept a livery stable in Klamath Falls. He and his partner became involved financially and Benson borrowed money of Moore, who is a horse dealer of Klamath county, giving him a chattel mortgage on the horses and other property. A few days ago, while Moore was in Eastern Oregon buying horses, Benson came to Ashland, telling his partner at Klamath Falls that Moore had given him permission to sell the horses. He went from here to Medford and on Tuesday last sold two bay horses on which Moore held a chattel mortgage. He was riding another horse which belonged to Moore and which Moore admits he had given Benson permission to use. Moore thinks he has ridden this horse out of the country and has probably disposed of him by this time.
