

WILL CORBETT FIGHT BLACK?

If Johnson Whips Jeff, the Former Champion May Take Upon Himself the White Man's Burden and Challenge Negro to Contest.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 1.—If Jack Johnson whips Jim Jeffries while Jim Corbett take up the white man's burden and challenge the negro for the title?

Many persons, among them some of the former heavyweight king's intimate friends, believe he will. While Corbett has not given a direct intimation that he will go after Johnson in the event that his bosom friend Jeffries falls before the black demon, his recent talk and actions lead to a justifiable belief that the bee is buzzing in his bonnet.

Gentleman Jim Corbett does not hold Johnson in a very high regard either as a man or a fighter and he had not been a bit backward in expressing his opinion. He claims that when he challenged the negro soon after the latter's return from Australia, John Arthur took a run out powder. Corbett insists that he was sincere in his desire at that time to fight Johnson but gave away to Jeffries when the big fellow decided to make a try for the crown that he had put aside.

Corbett Training.

But Corbett apparently has been making ready for contingencies despite his oft-expressed belief that Jeffries will have little trouble in rescuing the championship to the white race. Months ago he began to train quietly, doing only light work until his wind had the kinks taken out of it. Then he went in for the heavier stuff, working for the speed that made him the greatest boxer that ever stepped into a ring. It was only within the past few weeks, however, that he came out into the open and let it be generally known that he was going through a genuine course of preparation. He appeared daily in Cooper's gymnasium in New York, working with the apparatus and medicine ball and doing much shadow boxing.

The result of all this work was apparent at Rowardennan where Corbett arrived yesterday, when in the absence of Jeffries, who had gone fishing because he felt that it was too hot to work, he went through a line of work that astonished his audience.

He tugged at the weights with the vim and strength of a man who had been hard at work for weeks, did a long spell of shadow boxing at something almost like his old speed, tore around the handball court like a scared deer, playing the best man down there into a state of utter collapse and then doing some more shadow boxing. When he finished he was almost as fresh as when he started. He declared that within a week he would be in fine shape and ready to take Jeffries on for some rousing bouts.

The man with the hunch that Corbett will challenge Johnson if Jeffries is defeated is of the opinion that the ex-champion will not seek a battle with the negro over the marathon route, but will insist that the articles call for no more than twenty-five rounds and that the meeting take place in September.

FORMER TREASURER TREAT DEAD OF APOPLEXY

NEW YORK, June 1.—Charles Henry Treat, former treasurer of the United States, died at the Hotel Victoria today of apoplexy. He was sixty-two years of age. He was wife and two daughters were present at the time of his death.

Treat was appointed treasurer in June, 1905, and served until the beginning of the Taft administration, when Lee McClung, treasurer of Yale, was appointed to succeed him.

Approach of Commencement at State University Finds Local Delegation Hard at Work Preparing for Exams—Plan to Stay for Exercises.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Or., June 1.—The approach of commencement at the state university finds the Medford delegation of students very busy preparing for their examinations. Miss McNeal, who was graduated last year with high honors, is finishing her first year of post-graduate work. Miss Ruth Merriek, Miss Clara Wines, Fred Strang and Ernest Smith, all well-known in Medford, are at the close of their sophomore year, while Miss Katherine Armour and Vernon Vawter are passing on from the status of freshmen.

Most of the students are planning to stay over for commencement week, which comes on the 19th, 20th, 21st and 22d of June. The festivities planned for commencement this year are more elaborate than in previous years.

The university expects to entertain a large number of visitors from over the state. Last year there was a large excursion of Portland people to commencement, and a like one is being planned for this year. A grant of one and one-third fare has been made by the Southern Pacific from all parts of the state.

RABIES RAGING AMONG IDAHO DOGS AND COYOTES

LEWISTON, Idaho, June 1.—People of Central Idaho are greatly alarmed on account of the prevalence of rabies among the domestic dogs and coyotes of the region.

According to a dispatch today from Grangeville 3-year-old Dora Hamilton, who was bitten by a dog ten days ago, is in a serious condition. She shows every symptom of rabies, according to physicians. Several other persons, children and adults, have been bitten by dogs recently. Their cases are being watched closely by physicians.

The city council at Grangeville last night passed an order that all dogs must be muzzled or chained. The police have been ordered to kill on sight all canines running at large after today.
