LOWER RATES ASKED.

sustained by the commission. Mr. Miller denied "protection" of any special interest, declaring that rates were fixed in what was deemed the best interests of the railroad and country served.

An indication was given also that the shippers of southern Oregon believe that the value of the land grant to the Oregon & California railroad, now the Southern Pacific, should be considered in the making of rates. In reply to a question, Mr. Miller asserted that the value of the grant was never considered in establishing rates and that he did not know the value of the lands. Mr. Lang asked if it was not about \$50,000,000, but the question was not allowed.

ed to Mr. Miller's attention, but he declared that different conditions had to be met in different localities, in basing railroad class rates. Discussing canned goods, as an illustration, he said that on the O. R. & N. competition by eastern houses had been a factor in fixing the rates from Portland, while on the Southern Pacific the chief competition was with San Francisco and other California points.

In reply to a question, Mr. Miller said he did not believe that a "spread" applied between fourth and fifth-class rates equivalent to 15 per cent of the first-class rate was a just one, and his attention was thereupon called by Mr. Lang to such a "spread" in the rates either in effect or ordered by commissions in Iowa, Nebraska and Kansas. For instance, where the first-class rate was \$1 the "spread" or difference between fourth and fifth-class rates would be 15 cents or 15 per cent of \$1. Mr. Miller asserted that the conditions in no two states could be used as a basis for fixing rates in any other part of the country.

An effort was also made to have Mr. Miller state what conditions led to the granting of terminal rates to Marysville, Call., and why if Marysville was entitled to terminals, Albany, Or., was not.

Knowledge Is Disclaimed.

Mr. Miller disclaimed all knowledge of conditions in California, but expressed the opinion that Albany was not entitled to terminal rates.

The question of the difference in cost of hauling freight in Medford

and Portland terminals was also raised, but Mr. Miller declared he was unable even to hazard a guess, saying that such figures would have to be obtained from other officials. The commission indicated a desire to ascertain this difference in terminal charges at a succeeding meeting. Mr. Miller, in reply to an inquiry, stated that up to June 1, the total freight receipts by the Southern Pacific in Oregon on state and interstate business was greater than for the same period in 1909, but did not give the figures.

Teal Is Called Upon.

J. N. Teal, who is attorney for the transportation committee of the Portland chamber of commerce, was also called by Mr. Lang, but Mr. Teal refused to admit that he was a rate expert and testimony sought from him was barred by the commission on the ground that it would reveal privileged communications between attorney and client.

Mr. Teal was asked if the Portland jobbers would not oppose any reduction in less than carload rates that would reduce the difference between less than carload and carload rates. An objection by Judge Fenton was sustained.

Mr. Teal and Mr. Miller were the only witnesses examined before the commission yesterday and an adjournment was taken in the afternoon, the hearing to be resumed subject to five days' notice. At the next hearing it is expected that certain exhibits called for by the commission will be presented by the railroad company. Chief of these is a statement based on an average of two months' business showing a segregation of the intrastate and interstate Pacific lines in Oregon.
