DRY PETITIONS NAMED FAULTY

Chief Clerk Secretary's Office Says Defects Appear Which Must Be Changed Before They Can Be Considered Legitimate.

SALEM, Or., June 3.—H. H. Corey, chief clerk of the secretary of state's office, said today that practically all the petitions for submission to the voters of the statewide prohibition question do not comply with the law and cannot be filed, and the question submitted until the defects shall have been remedied.

The lists of names are not sworn to and are not copied on the back of the sheets, as required. Also many have been sent in by mail by unknown persons and not consecutively numbered, as the law requires.

AVIATOR ROLLS CONGRATULATED

Count De Lesseps, Who Recently Crossed Channel, Wires His Congratulations to Aviator Who Crossed and Returned.

PARIS, June 3.—Count Jacques De Lesseps, the aviator who recently flew across the English channel from Calais, landing near Dover, today wired his congratulations to Captain Charles Stewart Rolls, who yesterday flew across the channel and back again on one continuous journey.

"The success of Captain Rolls," said De Lesseps, "leaves nothing in the way of channel aviation. The captain was successful in what I myself attempted to do, the crossing and recrossing of the channel in one flight. He is entitled to every praise the feat deserves.

"The next attempt probably will be a flight from England to Germany across the North sea. That is something well worth striving for and I expect to see it accomplished within a year."

MRS. HUGH HUME HAS PASSED AWAY

Wife of Portland Editor Dies at Sanitarium in Pasadena—Has Many Friends in Rogue River Valley.

PORTLAND, Or., June 3.—Mrs. Hugh Hume, wife of Hugh Hume, former editor of the San Francisco Post, and now editor of the Portland Spectator, one of the best-known society women of San Francisco, died yesterday in a sanitarium at Pasadena, Cal., according to private dispatches received here.

Mrs. Hume is the sister of George De Forest Brush, a well-known painter. She had been ill for several months.

Mrs. Hume was of a highly artistic nature herself, and was considered the first authority on art in the circle in which she moved. She was largely instrumental in founding the Arts and Crafts club, and most of the beautiful displays of craftsmanship brought here from other cities were selected by Mrs. Hume.

Her husband and brother are the only immediate relatives that survive. It is not known at present whether the remains will be brought to Portland for burial or interred in California.

Mrs. Hume was well known in the Rogue River valley and has a host of friends here who mourn her untimely end.
