

TEAMSTERS ARE STILL ON STRIKE

Strikebreakers Will Not Be Imported From Other Cities, as Draymen Hope to Settle Dispute by Other Methods.

PORTLAND, Or., June 4.—The Draymen's association announced today that its members would not import strikebreakers from California or Washington to break the transfer teamsters' strike for a 25-cent wage increase unless other methods fail.

The announcement was made in answer to a rumor that professional strikebreakers were to be sent to Portland from San Francisco.

President Herman of the Holman Transfer company said:

"We shall either try to persuade our old teamsters to return to work or shall replace them with Portland teamsters, if the old men refuse to consider our advances. As a last resort, it might be necessary to import teamsters."

The strikers have picketed every barn in the city and every dock and warehouse. Strike leaders declare that the fight for higher wages is practically won.

Only one arrest has been made thus far—William H. Jobs, president of the Jobs Milling company of St. Johns, a suburb, who was arrested late yesterday and charged with having drawn a revolver on a party of union pickets.

Word has been received that the executive board of the International Brotherhood of Teamsters has voted \$35,000 to support the strike.

TO CONSOLIDATE MANY BIG HOTELS

Interests Valued at \$10,000,000 to Be Brought Under One Head—Combine Will Include Many of the Best Known Hotels of Country.

UTICA, N. Y., June 4.—Arrangements for the consolidation of hotel interests, valued at \$10,000,000, are being consummated here today and the combine will include many well-known hotels between San Francisco and New York.

The United Hotels company organized last March with a capitalization of \$500,000, has consolidated with the Ritz-Carlton Hotel company of San Francisco and the eastern interests of the Vanderbilts.

A board of directors made up of representatives of all the combined interests has been chosen to conduct future operations of the big syndicate. Frank A. Dudley of Niagara Falls is president of the board.

95 PERCENT IOWA FRUIT CROP LOST

Only One Per Cent of Pear Crop Remains—Berry Crop Is Entirely Gone.

DES MOINES, Ia., June 4.—Ninety five per cent of the fruit crop of Iowa was destroyed by the late killing frosts, according to a report issued by Wesley Green, secretary of the state horticultural department.

He estimates that the grape crop suffered 75 per cent and the black-berry crop more than 50 per cent. There will be practically no yield of gooseberries and currants and only 1 per cent of the peach, pear and plum crop. The cherry crop will reach 4 per cent, apples 3 per cent, strawberries and raspberries will be about 30 per cent of the normal.

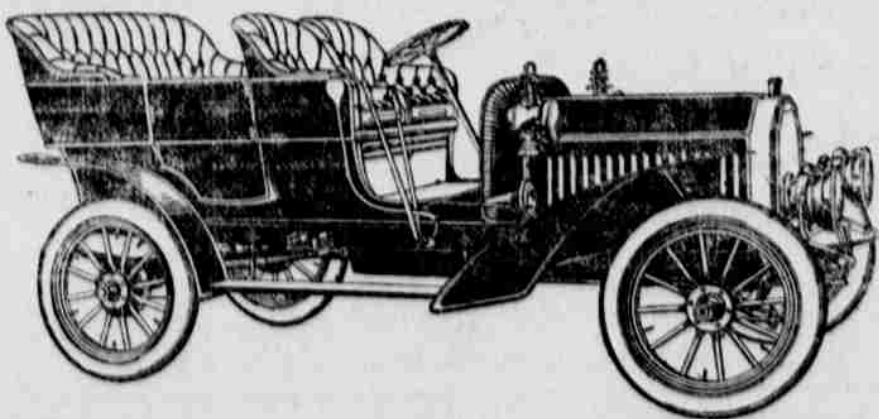
