The defense holds that a bribery charge influencing matters outside was paid in Chicago. The state holds that the payment of the money consummated the bribery and that therefore the alleged offense is indictable in Cook county. ASHLAND SCHOOL BONDS ARE CALLED IN BY CLERK

At a business session of the city board of education held Tuesday evening the clerk was ordered to call in \$3000 of 6 per cent high school bonds, says the Tidings. The total bonded debt of the district will thus be reduced to \$22,000, \$12,000 of this being the bonds floated to build the East Side school and \$10,000 being the amount of high school bonds yet unpaid.
