

TESTING LAW IN BRIBERY CASE

Man Indicted for Bribery in Connection With Election Is Surrendered by His Bondsmen—Move Is Made to Test Jurisdiction.

CHICAGO, Ill., June 4.—Democratic Leader Lee O'Neil Browne of the Illinois legislature, indicted for bribery in connection with the election of William Lorimer for the United States senate, was today surrendered by his bondsmen, Alderman Powers. Judge Scanlan at once issued a writ of habeas corpus, returnable Monday.

The move was made to test the question of the jurisdiction of the Cook county courts in the alleged bribery case.

The defense holds that a bribery charge influencing matters outside of Cook county was consummated outside the county even if the money was paid in Chicago. The state holds that the payment of the money consummated the bribery and that therefore the alleged offense is indictable in Cook county. The question will be the one at issue when argument in the habeas corpus proceedings are heard Monday. Should it be ruled that Cook county courts have jurisdiction, it is understood that bonds will be furnished again by Alderman Powers.

ASHLAND SCHOOL BONDS ARE CALLED IN BY CLERK

At a business session of the city board of education held Tuesday evening the clerk was ordered to call in \$3000 of 6 per cent high school bonds, says the Tidings. This action was taken after a careful consideration of the financial accounts of the district, which showed a total of over \$14,500 cash on hand at the present time. The total bonded debt of the district will thus be reduced to \$22,000, \$12,000 of this being the bonds floated to build the East Side school and \$10,000 being the amount of high school bonds yet unpaid. Fifteen thousands dollars of the latter have been paid off during the last six years, the original amount of the high school bond issue being \$25,000.

The board also directs the clerk to give notice of the annual school election to be held on Monday, June 20, on which date the annual account of the district will be rendered to the taxpayers, and the voters will be called upon to choose a successor to Dr. H. M. Shaw, now serving as president of the board, whose five-year term is about to expire. Whether Dr. Shaw, who has made a most excellent official, is ambitious or willing to serve another term has not been announced.

ACQUITTED FOR MURDER; ARRESTED FOR BIGAMY

ST. LOUIS, Mo., June 4.—Following her acquittal on a charge of having murdered William J. Erder, Mrs. Dora Doxey was arrested at her hotel here today on a bigamy warrant served by a deputy from Clayton. The woman was taken to Clayton, where she furnished a bond and was released. She spent the day with her father.

Mrs. Doxey said that she would prove that she did not know that she was committing a bigamy when she married Erder. A charge of obtaining money under false pretenses also is pending against Mrs. Doxey. Dr. Doxey, her husband, who was indicted in connection with the supposed murder of Erder, is delighted with the outcome of the trial. The acquittal of Mrs. Doxey foreshadows the probability that he will not be brought to trial on the charge pending against him.

WOMAN IS BEATEN BY VICIOUS THUG; MAY DIE

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 4.—Mrs. Johanna Maun is dying today from injuries inflicted by a thug, who beat her into unconsciousness at Fifteenth and Folsom streets last night and then robbed her of jewelry and \$10 in money. She was left lying on the sidewalk, where she was found half an hour later, still unconscious, by a policeman who rushed her to a receiving hospital.

Mrs. Maun's body was bruised in many places and her skull was fractured. The robber used a heavy club. When the victim recovered consciousness today she told the police what she remembered of the attack. It was at first thought she had been struck by an electric car. Mrs. Maun is proprietress of the Columbia dairy, San Jose, but resides at 57 Chattanooga street, San Francisco.

FRISCO UNIONS AID BRETHREN IN LOS ANGELES

Labor Council Votes to Support Metal Workers in Los Angeles in Their Fight for a Higher Wage Scale.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 4.—The San Francisco labor council and affiliated unions will support the metal trades unionists of Los Angeles in their fight for the eight-hour day and the \$4 minimum wage. On motion of Delegate John I. Nolan, the council last night unanimously indorsed the action of the strikers and instructed the secretary to communicate with affiliated unions urging them to be generous in contributing financial support to them.

Secretary Andrew J. Gallagher advised the iron trades delegates in the hall to have the iron trades council of this city appoint a large committee for the purpose of visiting the unions of San Francisco and vicinity and urging them to levy an assessment on the membership. He declared that the back of the Merchants' and Manufacturers' association of Los Angeles must be broken if trade unionism is to prosper in this country, and pointed out that the fight of the Los Angeles unionists is the fight of every union man in the country.

The situation there, he said, is similar to the one in San Francisco in 1901, the year of the city front federation strike. The winning of that struggle marked the beginning of the labor movement of San Francisco, today the most unified and successful in the world.

SANTIAGO DE CUBA WRECKED BY EARTHQUAKE

Scores of Houses are in Ruin and Debris Fill Streets—Many Families are Leaving for Havana to Escape From Hardships.

SANTIAGO DE CUBA, June 4.—Scores of houses are in ruins today and debris fills the streets, following an earthquake here late last night.

Two persons were killed and several injured by falling masonry. Many of the wealthier families are leaving today for Havana, owing to conditions here.

The amount of damage done by the temblor cannot be estimated accurately at this time. Many business houses and residences were destroyed and other buildings twisted on their foundations so that they probably must be torn down.
