REVENUES OF CITY FOR MAY

Recorder's Report Shows Balance in Most Funds—\$325 for Auto Licenses and \$800 for Saloon Licenses—Water Rentals \$904.

The city recorder's report for the month of May was filed with the council Tuesday evening. The general fund shows receipts for the month of \$2095 and expenditures of \$1631 with a balance on hand of \$6408.

Liquor licenses yielded the city the sum of \$800, auto licenses the sum of \$325. Taxes brought in \$845 and miscellaneous receipts \$123.

The library fund showed receipts from taxes of \$21 and expenditures of \$147, leaving a balance on hand of \$21.

The water fund showed rental receipts totaling \$904 and taps of \$884.

The park fund exhibits receipts of \$106 and expenditures of \$63.40, leaving \$1057 on hand.

The gravity water fund shows a balance on hand of \$15,243, after paying Hanley \$2000 and legal expense of \$140, and the contractors' 12th estimate of \$7010.

MANY MILES IMPROVEMENTS

City Engineer's Report for May Shows Nearly Mile of Cement Sidewalks and Miles of Streets Surveyed for Paving and Sewer.

City Engineer H. E. Foster's report for March shows 4109 feet of grades established for cement sidewalks and 11,002 feet of streets connected for paving and grading estimates.

Curb stakes were set for paving on Genessee street, West Tenth, Fourth street West and North Holly, totaling 8038 feet. Sewer grades were set in the alley from Eighth to Ninth between Bartlett and Central avenue.

Surveys were made of North Holly, S. Holly, W. Tenth, W. Fourth, First street North and South, W. Sixth, Laurel street, North and South; Orange street, N. Peach and Jackson streets, and the streets measured and monuments placed.

Surveys and estimates were made for a reinforced concrete wall east of the Bear street bridge. The rock piles of the Warren Construction Co. were measured and contents computed.

Forty permit for sewer connections were received and made, and other work done, showing that the month has been an extremely busy one.

SLOW REGISTRATION IN JACKSON COURT

The registration books for the general election next November were opened Tuesday, but the prospective voters seemed in no hurry to avail themselves of the privilege of enrolling their names upon the "great registrar."

County Clerk Coleman reports that he had registered "seven or eight" and a careful canvass of the local notaries failed to reveal a single applicant for the right to vote on the first day of the opening of the registration books. The registration for the primaries is just as important, perhaps more so, than that for the general election. It does not require any more exertion and answer a double purpose, giving the applicant a vote at both elections.

One reason for the slow registration in Medford is the change in the boundaries of the precincts.
