PORTLAND SUMS UP RESULT OF ROSE FESTIVAL

Great Week is Over—Estimate That 150,000 People From Outside Towns Visited Metropolis and Spent Three and a Half Millions.

PORTLAND, June 11.—Rose Festival week is over and Portland is beginning to sum up the results of her third year of annual celebration. The result, while not disappointing, is not what was expected. The show was worth the price of admission, especially when the performance was up to the individual Portlanders, but the committee of arrangements was a trifle in the shadow. They were not exactly a "dead one" but just "near dead." The city did its part and the committee—well, let its members die in peace.

About 150,000 persons from outside cities and towns attended the festival, and while rash guesses were made as to the number in town, one has only to stop a moment and think of what this means in a city of about 200,000 population. One hundred and fifty thousand persons mean that the population of a good sized city was added to that of Portland. Therefore, from a financial viewpoint the festival was a success. Those 150,000 visitors spent an average of \$25 each, and this meant that \$3,750,000 found its way into the pockets of hotel men, restaurateurs and saloon men. The stores did not fare well. The crowd was here for a good time and shopping was not on the list.

From an unbiased standpoint one would consider that aside from the advertising a city receives, the festival idea is not what it's cracked up to be. It is just what a city gives and gets back, no more nor no less. Some merchants of Portland say they favor especially elaborate festivals once in three years, when these could be carried through on an extensive scale, and not spasmodically throughout a few days of good, bad and indifferent parades.
