CALIFORNIA WILL SHIP PEARS SOON

Few of Early Variety Have Been Shipped — Bartlett Season Will Open in About Ten Days—One Carload Shipped.

The California Fruit Distributors, under date of June 11, issued the following market letter to the trade:

The following gives number of cars of deciduous fruit shipped from all points in California for the week (seven days) ending Friday morning, June 10 1910:

Cherries—49 cars. The cherry movement is at its height, and it can be expected that shipments will soon begin to drop off. With the exception of a few boxes in the Placer county districts all this fruit is coming from San Jose.

Apricots—87 1/2 cars. This variety has been in much larger supply during the week just passed, and it is not expected that there will be any increase in the shipments from this time on. The early sections have now nearly finished and it will be from later places that the future supply will be obtained. It is expected that the shipment of this variety to the auctions will be very much curtailed after this week, but we will be able to secure all the supplies that will be required for the f. o. b. markets for the next two weeks. The quality of the fruit is now very much better than earlier in the season.

Peaches—41 1/2 cars. There has been a heavy increase in peach shipments since our last report. Alexanders are now nearly gone and future shipments for the next ten days will consist of Hales, Triumph and St. Johns, the two former varieties largely predominating for the next week.

Plums—42 cars. The volume of the plum shipment is very much larger than it has been before this season. Clymans are nearly gone and the better varieties, such as Climax, Red June and Abundance, are now going forward, together with a small quantity of Tragedys and Burbanks. Both of these last mentioned varieties will be in good supply in about ten days.

Pears—1 1-2 cars. A few early pears, such as Comet and Wilder, have been shipped during the past week. They will not be in large supply at any time during the season. A few Early Bartletts will probably go forward to auction in about ten days.

Grapes—This fruit continues very promising. The grapes are growing fast and the size of the berry is very good. Weather has generally been very pleasant during the past week, with the exception of one day, when it was quite warm, and yesterday when a heavy wind did considerable damage in the Vicaville and Acampo sections. Fruit is developing in good shape and promise to be of better quality than that which has already gone forward. In spite of adverse weather conditions existing in the east, we have experienced very good demand for fruit in the f. o. b. territory.

CATTLE MARKET IS STEADY TO STRONG

Demand for Both Cattle and Sheep Has Been Brisk—Hog Market Assumes Steady Position.

NORTH PORTLAND, Or., June 13.—Receipts at this market for the week ending today were: Cattle 2054, calves 395, hogs 1250, sheep 6183, horses and mules 47.

The cattle market for the week has been steady to strong, with the recovery of from 15 to 25 cents from the break of last week. The sheep market has been strong to higher, while the hog market assumed a steady position after the decline of the first part of the week. The demand for cattle and sheep has been brisk.

Happenings of interest to the livestock trade has been the retirement of William Shepherd, a long-time cattle buyer at Portland, to look after his own interests; the establishment of a horse and mule market is also worthy of note, and horse and mule raisers of the Pacific northwest can take advantage of this opportunity of disposing of their surplus draft animals.

WIND DOES GREAT DAMAGE TO FRUIT

Vaca Valley Orchardists Lost Thousands of Dollars When Gale Tears Trees—Ground Is Covered With Green Fruits.

VACAVILLE (Solano Co.), June 13.—The greatest damage ever done to the orchards of Vaca valley in all the many years' history of the fruit industry here, occurred Friday, when a heavy south wind whipped the heavily laden trees about, tearing off branches and covering the ground with green fruit that is unfit for any use and a total loss to the orchardists.

Hundreds of tons of apricots, plums, peaches and Bartlett pears, the leading crops, cover the ground beneath the trees in the orchards throughout the valley, and the trees are left in bad shape on account of broken limbs. Some orchards have little fruit left upon the trees.

Probably the greatest damage done by the storm was to the trees that were grafted during the past year. The grafted branches, not yet solidly grown to the trees, were blown out by the force of the wind. In one fifteen-acre orchard 10,000 plum grafts were blown out in this manner, the loss amounting to several thousands of dollars. The total damage done in Vaca valley cannot be closely estimated at this time, but it will amount to many thousands of dollars. This had, up to yesterday, been a most successful season for the orchardists, and Vaca valley is one of the best fruit growing districts in the world. There are few crop failures here, and disasters like that of yesterday were heretofore unknown.

LITTLE NEW LOCAL STUFF COMING IN

Medford Markets Show Little Change But the Tendency in Fruit and Produce Is Bearish—Loganberries Run From \$1 to \$1.25.

The Medford local produce market has a decided bearish tendency in the few fruits and vegetables which have so far been offered.

New potatoes have dropped to \$1.75 and are getting close to the price where a fellow can eat green peas and new spuds without thinking he is living beyond his means.

Strawberries rule strong at \$1.50 per crate, while Logan's run from \$1 to \$1.25.

Cherries are plentiful at 6c and 8c. No local stone fruits have appeared in the market as yet, but peaches and apricots are due within a short time. The hay, grain and meat prices still hold as they were.
