MAN'S HEAD IS PLAY-THING OF RIVER CURRENTS

Captain of Ferryboat Is Badly Mangled by Wheel in Pilot House—Engineer Sees Blood Dripping and Goes to Rescue.

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 15.—His suspicions aroused that something was wrong by the sight of blood dripping into the engine room of the ferry City of Vancouver from the floor of the pilot house above, Engineer D. B. Brumagin sent Del Walker to investigate in time to save the life of Captain Wilbur Balbridge, who had been hurled to the floor by the pilot wheel, which had got beyond his control.

At the St. Joseph's hospital today it is said that the injured man will recover.

The flying spokes of the wheel tore off his left eyelid, cut a three-inch gash in his tongue, lacerated his arm and rendered him unconscious for three hours.

Captain Balbridge said today that his coat pocket became entangled with the big wheel, and that he was lifted off the floor, hurled into the air and dashed downward.

When he was rescued his head was being struck by the wheel, as it swung backward and forward, a plaything of the currents of the Columbia river.

BODY OF MAN WHO FELL IN CRATER IS FOUND

TWIN FALLS, Idaho, June 15.—The body of C. E. Bell, a well-known miner in this region, who plunged into the mouth of an extinct volcano crater near the head waters of the Bruneau river, and fell 800 feet to his death, was brought here for burial today.

Bell's body was recovered several days ago by fellow miners from Jarbridge, after they had risked their lives in descending into the steep-sided pit.

Bell, with a party of prospectors, arrived at the crater in February.

He started to cross over the mouth of the crater on a heavy bank of ice, heedless of his companions' warnings.

He had proceeded but a foot or two when the bank caved and Bell with a terrible cry disappeared.

There had been a number of attempts previously to recover Bell's body.

TRAFFIC ARRANGEMENT IS REPORTED ON TWO ROADS

NEW YORK, June 15.—A traffic agreement, which is believed today will terminate in a permanent agreement, has been made between the Southern Pacific and the St. Louis & San Francisco railroads and will include all their lines west of the Mississippi, south of the Missouri and extending to the gulf and the Pacific. These two roads will dominate this territory, although their lines are in no way parallel.
