FIGHT HAS NOTHING TO DO WITH FAIR

So Declares Many Congressmen in Talking of Action of Committee in Postponing Consideration.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 17.—Discussing the action of the senate foreign affairs committee, Representative Kahn said: "I see no connection between the Jeffries-Johnson fight and the world's exposition. The committee's decision suits us, California already has the money."

Representative McKimley of California said: "I do not think the two events should be confounded. The fight and the exposition are distinct and different subjects."

Representative Hayes of California echoed the statements of his colleagues. Representative Sims of Tennessee said: "I favor New Orleans, but would not oppose San Francisco, because the fight may be held there."

Representative Miller of Kansas said: "I would not favor any city encouraging prize fights. I think that state should observe the wishes of the people and a vast majority of people. Therefore, I favor a state that respects the sentiment of the majority of the inhabitants of the United States."

Representative Douglass of Ohio said: "I am glad the fight is to be prevented. I am glad the nullifying act was withheld so long. The action should have been taken long ago."

LAST THREE JAPS ARE DRIVEN AWAY

Darrington Completes Move Against Nippon's Sons and Town is Entirely Free of Little Brown Men.

EVERETT, Wash., June 17.—A special from Darrington today says that three more Japanese, the last in town, were driven out of the village last night by the townspeople. This is the first intimation that any orientals had been allowed to remain in the town after last Monday's action.

Consul Hayashi, who is here, denies that he ever stated that his countrymen would be sent back to Darrington under armed guard. Sheriff Deering of Snohomish county says he will take no action. He received the following telegram from Acting Governor Howell: "Japanese consular wires that Japanese were forced out of Darrington. Ask protection. Investigate matter and render necessary protection."

Deering replied: "People of Snohomish county law abiding and peaceable; no cause for alarm."

He sent a Deputy to Darrington Tuesday, who returned with the report that the town was quiet.

ASHLAND VOTES BONDS FOR NEW SCHOOL HOUSE

Light Vote Is Cast Bonding District for \$75,000—New High School and Other Improvements Are Planned.

ASHLAND, June 17.—By a very light vote the proposition to bond the Ashland school district in the sum of \$75,000 for the erection of a high school building has been adopted. In a total vote of 91, 59 were cast for and 28 against the measure. A feature revealed when the ballots were officially counted was that out of less than 100 cast, four were defective, a percentage that was rather alarming, considering the plain proposition involved.

The adoption of the measure does not necessarily imply that the entire \$75,000 be used in the new venture. Just so much as necessary will be used and no more. The board saw fit to ask the maximum amount and then figured accordingly. It is conceded that the building will cost approximately \$50,000, leaving the balance for securing an eligible site, and the latter feature will be one of the problems for the directors to contend with, and in the event of being unable to reconcile opinions as to this phase of the question, another special election will be in order for the people to settle the matter.
