

# POLICE GUARD IS A GRIM JOKE

Each Nonunion Driver in Portland Is Guarded by Policeman Who Was Formerly a Union Man—Crisis in Strike Is Expected Soon.

PORTLAND, Or., June 18.—Grim humor marked the opening of the fight between the striking teamsters and the Draymen's association here when 25 strikebreakers were sent out on the wagons.

Each non-union driver was guarded by a special policeman. Later the employers were shocked to learn that all but 16 of the 50 police detailed to guard the strikebreakers and the property of the draymen were either active or former members of labor unions.

Union pickets at various docks and warehouses offered no violence. Their continual insistence on peace is proving puzzling to the employers, who have been begging police protection in anticipation of an outbreak, of which there have been no indications. The strike has been in progress for three weeks, but open hostilities were not declared until today, when imported drivers were put to work.

The detail of 50 non-unionists are but the advance guard of the 200 strikebreakers whom the employers have en route to Portland.

It is now believed that the strike will come to a crisis soon.

Mayor Simon today indignantly denied the imputations that he was "standing in" with the strikers as against the employers.

"I am going to give everyone a square deal," said Simon. "If the employes want police protection they can have it. Chief Cox has orders to protect any man who wants to work in Portland."

## C. C. CHAPMAN SUCCEEDS RICHARDSON AS BOOSTER

PORTLAND, June 18.—C. C. Chapman, organizer of the Chapman Advertising agency of this city, has been chosen to succeed Tom Richardson as manager of the Portland Commercial club. Mr. Chapman is recognized as one of the most able publicity men in the country.

He has been the principal speaker at a number of enthusiastic booster and development meetings in the larger cities outside of Portland, and for some time has conducted an extensive plan of community advertising, representing 34 communities.
