NAMES CHOSEN FOR NEW CAVES

Gold Hill Residents Meet and Choose "Gold Hill Caverns" as Name for Natural Wonder Recently Found Near That City.

"Chavner Junction" was the name selected by acclamation for the junction of the new railway with the Southern Pacific, at a mass meeting called by J. L. Hammersly, president of the Gold Hill Commercial club, recently, says the News.

The name was very appropriately chosen in honor of the late Thomas Chavner, the father of Gold Hill, whose estate has favored the new enterprise with donations of rights of way, sites, etc., to the extent of several thousand dollars.

"The Gold Hill Caverns" was the name chosen for the newly discovered caves on Kanes creek at the same meeting and in the same manner. The name was given so that it would be easy for tourists to remember at which town to stop when making a visit to the caves.

Among the speakers at Monday evening's meeting were J. L. Hammersly, J. A. Baxter, B. H. Harris, E. W. Cooper, D. H. Miller and A. J. Olsen.

Pleasant musical selections were contributed by Mrs. J. A. McDonough, Mrs. C. A. Peterson and Mrs. B. H. Harris.

At the close of the meeting the floor was cleared and a social dance ensued.

One of the sentiments expressed at the meeting was that it would be wise for the Commercial club to meet at least once a month.

RETURNING MINER STILL HAS FAITH IN IDITAROD

SEATTLE, Wash., June 18.—Reports that the Iditarod gold strike has fizzled out are scouted by J. H. Scott, the only arrival in Seattle this year direct from the diggings.

"While I do not look for a second Nome or Klondike, I am convinced that there is some great paying gravel bodies there," said Scott today.

"When I left the Iditarod dirt paying \$5 per square foot had been found on Flat creek. Pay dirt worth taking had been discovered on Otter, Willow, Slate, Black and Granite creeks, all tributaries of the Iditarod.

"I know conditions pretty well in that locality and I believe they are finding the yellow stuff in good quantities. But as I said before they are not going to make any very big clean-ups until they get in some big machinery."
