## TAFT WANTS ALL EXPENSES SHOWN IN CAMPAIGNS

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 20.—President Taft is planning to secure the passage of a bill providing for the publication of campaign expenses following the passage by the senate of the postal savings bill.

## JOHNSON AND LITTLE SETTLE THEIR DIFFICULTIES

SAN FRANCISCO, June 21.—Attorneys for George Little, the deposed manager of Jack Johnson, and counsel for the big black met last night and settled the mooted question whether Little presented Johnson with a fictitious check for \$300. Today the financial difficulties between Little and Johnson are smoothed away and honors are even on both sides.

Johnson went out on the road this morning and will continue his road work until almost the moment of departure for Nevada.

He planned to box this afternoon and tomorrow will thereby secure additional money, making a final cleanup Wednesday. The negro charges 50 cents apiece to those desiring to see him hammer his sparring partners.

Johnson paid his hotel bills at the Seal Rock house up to last night and unless he changes his mind will leave for Nevada on Thursday.

## SENATE TO INVESTIGATE FORMER BRIBERY CASE

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 21.—The senate today adopted a resolution providing for an investigation of the bribery charges in connection with the election of Senator William F. Lorimer of Illinois. The senate committee on elections will investigate the matter during the recess of congress.

Members of the lower house of the Illinois legislature have made the charges and alleged that they were bribed to vote for Lorimer for senator.

## MOODY CAN RETIRE SAY REPRESENTATIVES

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 21.—The house this afternoon passed the bill permitting Supreme Court Justice Moody of the United States supreme court to retire within the next five months. Justice Moody is in poor health.

## Must Be a Mail Carrier.

ALTON, Ill., June 21.—Charles W. Freeman, a young traveling salesman, is in a predicament as a result of having applied for a mail route in Yellowstone park. A year ago Freeman made application for the position. Since then he has taken a traveling position, which is more lucrative. Yesterday word came that he had been awarded the mail route and was to begin work July 1.

LONDON, June 21.—Following a romantic meeting, Miss Dorothy Deacon and Prince Antoine Radziwill will be married tomorrow. The bride to be is the most beautiful of the three daughters of Mrs. Baldwin, who was formerly Mrs. Edward Parker Deacon.

## To Fly Across Lake Ontario.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., June 21.—Dr. William Greene, a well-known aviator, plans to start tomorrow on a flying trip from Rochester across Lake Ontario to Toronto. Dr. Greene will use a bi-plane of his own design and manufacture. The distance across the lake is eighty-six miles.

## MANY DYING FROM HEAT IN MIDDLE WEST

Hot Wave Responsible for Death After Death—Prostrations Numerous—Steps Are Taken for Relief of the Poor.

PITTSBURG, Pa., June 21.—Three deaths due to the heat-wave that has visited Pittsburgh were reported to the police today. Six persons in addition have been prostrated by the heat. The hot weather still continues.

CHICAGO, June 21.—The hot wave which has resulted in 17 deaths here and caused intense suffering in the poorer quarters of the city was broken today by a cooling breeze which sprang up from Lake Michigan. Scores of heat prostrations have been reported.

CINCINNATI, O., June 21.—Two deaths and 11 prostrations resulted from the heat here today. The maximum temperature was 90 degrees.

## Printing Pressmen at Columbus.

COLUMBUS, O., June 21.—The annual convention of the International Printing Pressmen and Assistants' Union of North America was called to order yesterday by President George L. Berry. The convention, which will continue in session all week, is attended by delegates representing a membership of 22,000 throughout the United States and Canada. A plan to establish a tuberculosis sanitarium and old members' home for the union is one of the important matters to be considered by the convention.

## Chippewa Land Opening.

CROOKSTON, Minn., June 21.—There was a great rush of land seekers at the government land office here today at the opening of the Chippewa reservation lands to settlement. In all there are nearly 250,000 acres thrown open, including fertile tracts in the Fond du Lac, Deer Lake, Pigeon River, White Earth and Red Lake reservations. The lands are to be disposed of to actual settlers only, under the provisions of the homestead law.

## Special Primary Session in N. Y.

ALBANY, N. Y., June 21.—Pursuant to the call of Governor Hughes the New York legislature has convened in extra session today for the further consideration of the direct primary issue. A spirited fight is in prospect, with the governor, supported by the insurgent members, on one side, and the so-called republican machine on the other. Every effort will be made to put through a measure providing for a complete system of direct nominations.
