ARRAIGNMENT OF WEBB POSTPONED UNTIL MONDAY
PORTLAND, Or., June 25.—Indicted by the grand jury for the murder of William Johnson, Jesse Webb, the self-confessed slayer of Johnson, and Mrs. Carrie Kersh, who is charged jointly with him, appeared in the superior court for arraignment today.
As the woman had not secured an attorney as yet, the arraignment was postponed until Monday.
The indictment, which was returned last night by the grand jury, recites that Webb and Mrs. Kersh "deliberately and with premeditated malice, killed Johnson."
According to Webb's confession, however, the woman had nothing to do with the murder, but Webb said she assisted him in planning for the disposal of the body, and suggested stuffing it in the trunk in which it was found later.
SENATE TO INVESTIGATE AFFAIRS OF INDIANA
WASHINGTON, D. C., June 25.—The senate today decided to investigate the affairs of the Choctaw and Chickasha Indians following the charges of attempted bribery made yesterday by Senator Gore.
Gore recently introduced a resolution providing that the committee on Indian affairs investigate and ascertain at the next session of congress whether the Indians needed legal services in connection with the sale of their lands and to inquire whether 10 per cent commission provided in the sale contracts was reasonable.
Chairman Keam of the committee on contingent expenses presented the committee's favorable report on the resolution and it was adopted without discussion.

SAN FRANCISCO HAS RIGHT TO OWN ROAD

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 25.—The supreme court of California today decided that San Francisco has the right to enter into municipal ownership of public utilities when it handed down an unanimous decision upholding the city's contentions in the suit brought to restrain San Francisco from issuing bonds to acquire and operate a railroad on Geary street.
The suit was brought by Horace G. Platt, president of the Geary Street Railway company, a local corporation. Bonds recently were voted at a special election and the plaintiff sought to prevent their issuance by having the election declared invalid.
The opinion was written by Justice Angellotti. It declared that the intention of the city in entering into the business of street railroading was for the city and not for the court to decide.

Golden Drift Mining company. He took a bond on this property for \$15,000, payable in one and two years, \$5,000 within one year and \$10,000 in two years. He immediately went to San Bernardino, California, where his brother, A. B. Ament, and his sister, Mrs. Diamond, resided. These were a majority of the board of directors, which he had designated in his articles of incorporation of the Golden Drift Mining company, as a first board. While in this "family session" he proposed, according to the record, to sell his mine in Josephine county, called the "Dry Diggins," for practically one million and a half dollars, payable in stock, which was all of the stock of the corporation excepting seven shares set aside for the directors.
Made Several Sales.
Before he had organized the corporation he had made several sales of stock by written contract, in the name of the corporation, and which are in the evidence. After that he sold stock by written contract in the name of the corporation; to these contracts he signed his brother's name as president and accepted for the money himself as the agent of the corporation. The company at this time had no stock to sell, as all of its stock had gone out in this first meeting. Nevertheless, he conducted the office of the company in its name, receipted for the money as its agent and probably put the money in his pocket, at least so the evidence indicates.
Over \$100,000 Profit.
At the end of the first year of these transactions Ament, according to evidence, is said to have reaped more than \$100,000. He did this on the dividend scheme. In February, following the December in which the corporation was organized, he paid the first monthly dividend of 1 per cent on the capital stock. If it had been a honest dividend it would have been 1 per cent on \$1,500,000, which would have been \$15,000. Instead of that, the book entry shows that the total dividend paid was, for that month, \$167, which was a dividend only on that portion of his stock which people had purchased from him. The next month he paid a dividend of \$506, which was paid

two sets of books to be kept, one showing sales which he said were his, and other sales which he said were the company's. The company's were all those sales where the first payments were \$2 to \$4 and where the monthly payments were very very small, and his are now shown to be those which had large first payments and which for large amounts, and where the purchasers responsible. He took every cash sale that was made, totaling more than \$100,000, excepting two small sales which he allowed the company to take.
Ament had first testified he kept the record of these cash sales in a private account book, but that he could not find the book. He stated in his testimony Friday that he had never kept any such book and that there is no possible way to tell the exact amount of money that he received from cash sales, and this seems to be correct. In other words, it seems whatever record he had he has destroyed, at least the evidence gives that impression.
He was asked then to produce his bank book, showing the deposits from these sales. He testified that he did not carry a bank account, but kept the money in a safety deposit vault. He said one reason for this was he had judgments against him.

Auto in Game.

An automobile containing four citizens came up with the robbers, one of whom was on the horse, while the others were running and holding the stirrups. The posse opened fire and the man on the horse was killed. The others left the road for the timber near by, and later a shot was heard. The posse came upon the body of the second bandit soon afterward.
The bandit on horseback has been identified as "Abe Abeson," a New York crook. The third man, who is in custody, was wounded in both wrists. It is believed that he is a noted thief. The men are believed to have formed part of a gang that has been operating in New England for many months.
Lynchng Feared.
The captured bandit said that his name was Bill Kovinsky and that his home was in Boston. The police declare that he is Bacchlin Wisdowski of New York. He is being guarded carefully to prevent the possibility of a successful attempt to lynch.

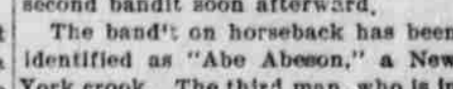
