GILLETT PASSES BUCK TO ATT'Y FREDERICKS

Governor Says He Knows Nothing of Terms of Fight Between Moran and Attell.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., June 25.—It is up to District Attorney Fredericks of Los Angeles to determine whether the glove contest between Abe Attell and Owen Moran is a prize fight, according to Governor Gillett.

"I know nothing of the terms of this contest," said Governor Gillett today, "and cannot pass on it. It is up to District Attorney Fredericks. I have no data at hand and cannot express an opinion as to whether it is a prize fight or not. I have nothing to add to my views on prize fighting, at this time."

GAMECOCK KILLS ARMY OFFICER; BLOOD-POISONING

BOSTON, Mass., June 25.—A sprike on the hand from the spur of a gamecock caused the death of Colonel William Bradford Homer, 64, a retired United States army officer, whose funeral will be held at Natick tomorrow.

Colonel Homer was inspecting the fowls on his place a few days ago when he received a spur wound which at the time caused him only slight pain. Blood-poisoning set in and the veteran's arm had to be amputated at the shoulder, but too late to save his life.

HEROINE OF STEAMER WRECK NOW A BRIDE

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 25.—It became generally known here today that Miss Maybelle Watson, the heroine of the steamer Columbia wreck of July 22, 1907, was quietly wedded to Ernest M. Burnett, a vaudeville pianist, on June 16 by a justice of the peace at San Rafael.

Mrs. Burnett was among the survivors of the Columbia wreck. She clung to a raft at night and saved another woman from drowning.

CAME NEAR GOING GASOLINE ROUTE

An employe of the Mission Grille, while filling a coffee heater with gasoline Saturday forenoon, came near making an aviation exhibition, together with part of the restaurant. Fortunately the gasoline burned and did not explode, and the flames were easily extinguished, although several patrons and the waiters in the dining room were considerably perturbed.

Old Landmark Burns.

PASSAIC, N. J., June 25.—The old Van Wagoner homestead, built in 1860, and at one time used by George Washington as his headquarters during the revolutionary war, is almost in ruins today from fire of unknown origin.

Although the estate was purchased by the late Henry P. Simmons several years ago, it never lost the title of the Van Wagoner homestead. In 1786 the house was enlarged and except for a few repairs from time to time has been unchanged since that time.
