REPRIEVE COMES AT LAST MOMENT

Man Is Seated in Electric Chair When Order Comes From Governor Granting Stay of Execution.

TRENTON, N. Y., June 29.—A stay of execution, signed and thrown from a passing train by Judge Minton, is responsible for Arthur Rose being alive today.

Rose was convicted of wife murder, was seated in the electric chair and the electrician, with his hand on the switch, was awaiting the signal to throw on 2,100 volts when the order reached the death chamber to stop the execution.

An attorney for Rose awaited the expected order from Judge Minton at the railway station and the document was dropped from a window of the train as it sped past Trenton. The attorney seized the reprieve and has come with it to the prison.

24—KNIFE

KNIFE WIELDER IS HELD TO ANSWER

Frank McDonald, Who Used Knife, Is Sent to Jail to Await Action of the Grand Jury—Man Cut Also Goes.

Frank McDonald was bound over to appear before the grand jury Tuesday by Justice Canon on a charge of having assaulted one John Warren with a dangerous weapon, to-wit, a knife.

The incident occurred in the Horse Shoe Club saloon on Front Street Monday evening, where, it appeared from the testimony, that a free-for-all fight occurred. In the melee Warren was slashed across the side of the face with a knife. McDonald was identified as the man who had wielded the weapon by Arthur D-Itz, John Ward and other by-standers, but Warren "didn't know who had cut him." After the cutting the knife mysteriously disappeared and has not been located.

Justice Canon bound McDonald over with bail fixed at \$500, in default of which he was remanded to the charge of the sheriff.

Warren, who was evidently trying to shield his assailant, was also remanded in default of bail. Both men were taken to Jacksonville Tuesday afternoon.

UNCLE SAM'S DOPE ON CROP IS LOW

(Pacific Coast Packer.)

Again the Packer feels called upon, in the interest of fairness, to state that the government report on the condition of apple crop is not an entirely reliable source of information. The accuracy of the individual reports is not questioned, but the average arrived at are by no means a fair estimate of the general condition of the crop.

The June figures placed the average condition for the whole country about 8 points below the condition a year ago, but in view of better prospects in the other important districts this year, compared with the last, such a statement is misleading. For instance, Iowa and the Dakotas, which produce comparatively few apples, commercially speaking, are placed 54 to 77 points below conditions a year ago, yet they are included in the figures from which the entire country's conditions are computed. There are several similar discrepancies in the June report.

In a less important degree the same errors occur in computing state averages; a 100 per cent condition for apples for districts where none are grown commercially is placed on the same basis in computing averages with a 50 per cent condition in a heavy producing district.

As a matter of fact, the thirteen leading apple producing states, according to June report, show an average condition of 73.7 this year compared with 71.4 a year ago.

Thus it is apparent that those interested in apples commercially should either consider the defect of the government report, or should investigate thoroughly its details and make allowances for its limitation.

ASHLAND GETS 1911 ENCAMPMENT

Ashland has been chosen as the place for the 1911 encampment of the Oregon division of the G. A. R. This goes to show that the representations made from this vicinity, backed by the influence of delegates personally on the spot at Astoria during the recent encampment, had their effect. But notwithstanding the fact that a year will intervene before the important event occurs, it stands the community in hand to plan for the gathering at an early date, and make the G. A. R. encampment of 1911 one of the notable events in reunion history.

Craig, post No. 14, Astoria, senior vice-commander; John Huntington, Lents, junior vice-commander; Dr. J. E. Hall, Portland, medical director; Rev. C. A. Stockwell, Silverton, chaplain. C. A. Williams of Portland was appointed as adjutant and quartermaster-general, which position he has held for a number of years.—Ashland Tidings.

SURVEYORS AT WORK AT LAKE O' THE WOODS

TWO FARAWAY QUAKES CAUGHT IN CLEVELAND

CLEVELAND, O., June 29.—Two earthquakes were registered on the seismograph at St. Ignatius college here today. The disturbance apparently occurred at a distance of 3000 miles from Cleveland.

The first shock lasted from 2:45 to 3:12 a. m. The second was a series of graduated tremors, the first vibrations beginning at 5:29 a. m. and lasting until 5:35, and the main shock at 5:32 and continuing until 6:24 a. m.
