SAYS COURT LENIENCY IS CAUSE CRIME WAVE

MILWAUKEE, Wis., June 30.—The capital punishment of habitual criminals was urged today by United States Judge George Holt in an address to the Wisconsin Bar association. Judge Holt blamed the leniency of the courts and the success of technical defenses for what he termed the present wave of crime.

"A convict, when he is discharged, is ready for new crimes," said the judge. "A commission should try him on the charge of being a habitual criminal and an incorrigible enemy to society. If it be proved that the man is degraded into a beast and incapable of substantial improvement and alteration, it is my opinion that he should be put to death."
