SHIPMENTS OF PEARS BEGIN

Cherry Season Over, Fourteen Cars of Apricots, Sixty-three Cars of Peaches, Two Hundred and Eleven Plums, Thirty-two of Bartlett's.

The California Fruit Distributors issue the following market letter under date of July 2:

The following gives number of cars of deciduous fruit shipped from all points in California for the week (7 days) ending Friday morning, July 1, 1910:

Cherries—Six cars. We will probably have no further shipments of this variety to report. Shipments for the season have now reached a total of 249 3-4 cars, which is exactly the quantity reported for last season and has exceeded our estimates by nearly 50 cars.

Apricots—14 1-2 cars. Apricots may now be said to be done, as there will be practically no more of them offered.

Peaches—63 1-2 cars. As predicted in our last letter, there has been a material falling off in the shipments of this variety. There will be no heavy shipments this week, but ample stock will be available after that time should they be required.

Plums—211 1-2 cars. The plum shipments has passed its zenith and supplies will gradually decrease until the close of the season. Tragedy, Simon, P. Deane, Burbank, Peach Ogon, and Mystery are now nearly done. Limited quantities will be available for the next few days. Other varieties mentioned in our last letter, such as Diamond, California Red and Sugar, together with Yellow Egg, Bradshaw, Sultan and Satsuma will be in liberal supply during the coming week.

Pears—32 1-2 cars. Bartlett's are now going forward from the Sacramento river district and are of fine quality. Straight and mixed cars of this variety are now available for the f. o. b. market.

Grapes—No change to report in condition of this fruit. The first Fontainebleau have made their appearance and have gone forward to auction. They will be in fairly liberal supply in one week to ten days.

Weather conditions continue very favorable and with the exception of a very few days has been cool and delightful. The slight burning reported from earlier sections last week, as indicated at that time, has resulted in but little damage.

STEAMER BALTIC HITS SHIP IN MID-OCEAN

NEW YORK, July 4.—When the steamer Baltic reached port today, her pumps were going and her collision bulk-heads were closed. They had been that way for three days, following a smash in mid-ocean by the Baltic and the oil tank steamer Standard, en route from Philadelphia to Copenhagen, one man, a seaman of the Baltic's crew was lost overboard. It is supposed that he was knocked from the deck by the impact and sank at once.

The collision was in a dense fog that prevailed on Tuesday night, when the Baltic was 1800 miles east of the Ambrose Channel Light.
