UMATILLA MAY GET OREGON FUND

Distribution of Twenty Million Dollar Reclamation Appropriation Will Probably Result in Construction of New Irrigation Project.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 6.—Secretary Ballinger has decided that Oregon is entitled to share in the distribution of the \$20,000,000 irrigation fund made available by congress just before adjournment, and it now seems quite likely that extension of the Umatilla project westward with a view to irrigating 60,000 acres more will be authorized, and that part of this fund will be allotted to begin construction.

There are but two projects in Oregon to which funds can be allotted, and it is certain Klamath can receive nothing. This makes it obligatory to make an allotment for the Umatilla extension and in case the report of the army engineer board is favorable, it is now believed Secretary Ballinger will recommend to the president that the west side Umatilla project be built. It is estimated to cost \$2,550,000. While the whole amount may not be allotted out of the \$20,000,000 fund, enough will be provided, if extension is authorized, to carry the work through the present season, and finish it with money from the regular fund.

REPUBLICAN PAPERS TO SUPPORT ASSEMBLY

Republican editors throughout the state are rallying to the support of the assembly, professing to see in that measure the preservation of the party, according to communications given out yesterday by the state central committee. The committee was advised in the afternoon that a meeting of republican editors has been called for July 20 for the purpose of going over the present situation in Oregon and taking such steps as may be required to aid the party in the coming elections.

Initiative in bringing about the assemblage of republican editors has been taken by the editors of five leading country papers. A formal call has been sent out to every republican editor in the state. The call is signed by J. S. Dellinger, of the Morning Astorian; B. H. Kennedy of the Baker City Herald; Carl Abrams of the Salem Statesman; W. S. Gilstrap of the Eugene Register and G. A. Hurley of the Oregon Oriano at Vale. The call follows:

"To the republican editors of the state: A meeting is hereby called of the republican editors of the state to meet in Portland at 10 o'clock a. m. on July 20 to perfect an organization of the republican editors of the state and to take such action as we see fit to help the republican cause in the state of Oregon. You are earnestly requested to be present and help us organize."

Twenty-one of the country republican papers have signified already their purpose of aiding the assembly plan. It is said at local republican headquarters. Among the papers are some of the strongest in the state and many of them have long been urging the republican voters to beware of misrepresentations concerning the assembly plan. It is expected that the list of favorable papers will be supplemented daily now that the work of getting the editors to take up an active part in the campaign has been undertaken from within the fold.

INSPECTORS FOR SEWER SYSTEMS

Complaint Over Construction Results in Mayor's Being Authorized to Appoint—Regular Monthly Budget of Bills Passed

The city council met in regular session Tuesday night. Welch, Emerick, Elfert, Demmer and Mayor Canon being present.

The report of the finance committee on the several bills presented was approved.

A permit was granted to Mrs. Cranfill to construct a screen porch around her residence at the corner of South Central and Ninth.

Street Sprinkling.
The matter of sprinkling the streets came up for discussion, but nothing final was done. It was agreed that an effort would be made to induce the property owners to sign up for the service between this time and the next meeting on Friday.

The bill of J. L. Stewart as inspector of pipe on the gravity line was held up for further consideration.

A motion instructing the mayor to appoint an inspector of the work of laying sewers was carried. It appears that numerous complaints have been made of the manner in which the work is being done, and an inspector was necessary.

Storm Sewers Discussed.
The matter of storm sewers was discussed at length. Valley gutters at crossing were not considered satisfactory for several reasons, but the expense of a system of catch basins and laterals to carry off the surplus waters was regarded as too great. The matter was finally referred to the mayor and city engineer for investigation and action.

Council then adjourned until Friday, July 8.
