## PUBLIC LIBRARY PATRONS GROW FAST IN NUMBER

During June Total of Library Subscribers Reached 1335 — Many New Books are Added to General Circulation by Library Club.

During our fine June weather the library was greatly patronized as evidenced by its circulation of 648 books. Thirty-three new patrons were added, making a total of 1335 library subscribers.

A large number of books are this week added to the general circulation of the library. These are the books from the Book club library organized last January by those patrons of the library who deposited \$1 each for a fund with which to purchase recent good books for the library. The books were read and enjoyed by the members of the club for six months. Now they are turned over permanently to the library and are free of access to all patrons. ## PREACHER PROMISES HOT SERMON ON BIG FIGHT

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 7.—"Lessons of the Jeffries-Johnson fight" will be the topic of a sermon by Rev. J. Milton Waldron, colored, next Sunday.

"I will say something to make the country sit up and take notice," said Rev. Waldron today. "I believe that because Johnson won prize fighting will be stopped forever. The white people are unjust to Johnson, but this does not change the principle that fighting is wrong.

"The newspapers are most to blame for the interest in prize fighting. If negroes attach undue importance to this fight, the whites are no more rational.

"Johnson should be allowed to appear here on the stage just as Sullivan and other pugilists have done."

## WIFE KILLS HUSBAND, DAUGHTER AND SELF

CHICAGO, July 7.—Declaring that she was unable to stand her husband's dissipation and his alleged attentions to another woman, Mrs. Emma Mulsaw early today shot Mulsaw and their daughter, and then drank carbolic acid, dying on the way to the hospital. Mulsaw and the girl will die.

Mulsaw left home last night after quarrelling with his wife. He returned early today. It is alleged he was intoxicated. He was met at the door by his wife, who fired two shots into his abdomen.

Mrs. Mulsaw then retired into an inner room, shot her daughter and, after leaving a brief note explaining her reasons for her acts, drank carbolic acid.

## MILL OWNERS GUILTY OF BLEACHING FLOUR

KANSAS CITY, Mo., July 7.—The federal jury in the so-called "bleached flour" cases returned a verdict against the flour mill owners, who were accused of adulterating flour. The decision means the loss of millions of dollars to the grain dealers and millers in the southwest, it is declared.

The cases have been before the federal court for several weeks. Experts were called to show that flour was whitened by a harmful process and that the practice of bleaching was general.

The Alsop process, a concern holding the patents under which flour was bleached, backed the millers in the fight. An enormous defense fund was gathered when the cases first came up and it is said that all the millers using the process were taxed to swell the fund. The contest, it is expected, will be carried through the higher courts.
