ORDINANCE NO. 352.

An ordinance providing for the matter of causing streets in the city of Medford to be sprinkled pursuant to petitions therefor, and the assessing of the cost thereof upon the property fronting, abutting and adjoining thereon.

The city of Medford doth ordain as follows:

Section 1. Whenever the owners of a majority of the property fronting, abutting and adjoining any street or portion thereof, in the city of Medford, shall petition the council to cause the same to be sprinkled during any period specified in said petition, which petition shall be in writing, the council may proceed immediately by resolution to order said street or portion thereof sprinkled.

Section 2. If said street shall be sprinkled by city without letting contract therefor, said resolution shall so declare and shall state the price which said city proposes to charge as the reasonable cost thereof, per front foot. Said resolution shall be published three times in a newspaper published and of general circulation in said city.

Section 3. At any time thereafter when the owners of a majority of the property fronting on said street or portion thereof shall petition the council in writing to order the sprinkling of said street, or portion thereof, to be stopped, the council may order said sprinkling to be stopped in accordance with said petition.

Section 4. At any time thereafter the council may proceed to assess the cost of sprinkling said street, or portion thereof, to be assessed against the property fronting, abutting and adjoining said street or portion thereof, proportionately to the frontage of said property on said street or portion thereof, but said assessment shall be made at no greater rate than the contract price paid by the city therefor, or the price specified in the resolution ordering said sprinkling, provided, however, that the cost of sprinkling the whole of said street, or portion thereof, including street intersections, may be assessed against the private property so fronting, abutting and adjoining thereon.

Section 5. Said assessment shall be made in the following manner:

The council shall declare by resolution its intention to assess all property fronting, abutting and adjoining said street or portion thereof, for the cost of said sprinkling, which resolution shall specify the period for

which said assessment is levied and the total amount per front foot of said assessment upon each lot or parcel of land so to be assessed. Said resolution shall designate the time and place of the meeting at which said assessment will be levied. Said resolution shall be published three times in a newspaper published and of general circulation in said city and be posted in three conspicuous places along said street, or portion thereof, at least ten days before the date of said meeting.

At the meeting of the council so designated, or at any adjourned session thereof, the council after hearing any protests and objections to said assessment may assess upon the property fronting on said street, or portion thereof, the cost of said sprinkling for said period, not exceeding the rate specified in the resolution ordering said sprinkling to be done, or the rate specified in the resolution declaring the intention of the council to levy said assessment, but no such assessment shall be levied to cover the cost of any sprinkling done after the filing of a petition pursuant to section 3 of this ordinance.

Section 6. When any petition is filed for the sprinkling of any street or portion thereof, as aforesaid, and the council shall be of the opinion that any part of such street or portion thereof, by reason of the character of its use requires a greater amount of sprinkling than the remainder, the council may divide said street, or portion thereof, into two or more sections, and may cause the several sections to be sprinkled in different manners, and may apportion the cost accordingly. When the width of the roadway to be sprinkled along any street shall vary, the council may also apportion the cost of said sprinkling accordingly, where by reason of said varying width the cost of said sprinkling on the wider portion shall be materially greater than in the case of the narrower portion, but in every case where the cost of sprinkling any portion of a street is to be assessed at a higher amount than the cost of sprinkling the remainder, that fact shall be set forth in the resolution above provided for, and for the purposes of the petition provided for by section 3 hereof, the portion of any street against the property fronting on which a higher rate is to be assessed than in the case of the remainder of the street, shall be a distinct and separate district.

Section 7. When said assessment shall have been made the same shall be declared by ordinance, entered in the docket of city liens and collected in the same manner as assessments for street improvements, but no such assessment shall be payable in installments.

The foregoing ordinance was passed by the city council of the city of Medford on the 8th day of July, 1910, by the following vote:
