AWAIT STATEMENT OF TEDDY ON NEW YORK

OYSTER BAY, N. Y., July 13.—Theodore Roosevelt today will hear the arguments of the New York Republican machine leaders against the legislative and political plan of Governor Hughes. Hughes left today for Washington, and Republican State Chairman Timothy Woodruff arrived at Sagamore Hill and will be a luncheon guest.

It is expected that Roosevelt will soon make his attitude in New York affairs known. Today he said that he would see the newspaper men tonight after Woodruff leaves, and it is probable that he will make a definite statement regarding the New York situation.

Governor Hughes, who went to Sagamore Hill yesterday and remained there until today, had a long conference with Roosevelt. The colonel and the governor sat on the veranda for hours last night engaged in earnest conversation. It is believed that the whole political program was canvassed.

As the governor departed today he was met by a host of newspaper men. "I had a most pleasant visit with Mr. Roosevelt," he said, "but further than that I have nothing to say."

It is understood that Hughes urged the necessity of incorporating a plank for direct primaries in the New York state platform. Most of the machine leaders oppose such an idea and it is probable that on this point a bitter fight will be waged.

BREAKS HIS BACK IN BATTLE OVER SANDWICH

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 13.—Ralph Phillips, formerly a postal employe, lies today in the Sisters of Mercy hospital with a broken back, and Jesse Navarre is in jail, the result of a battle over a sandwich in a curbstone lunch wagon.

Phillips entered the wagon and seized a "hot-dog" sandwich which Navarre had ordered, according to Navarre's story to the police. During the scuffle that ensued Phillips fell across a curbstone. His spine was broken and he sustained severe bruises about his head. It is doubtful if he will recover.

EARTHQUAKES HURRYING GLACIERS IN ALASKA

JUNEAU, Alaska, July 13.—The unusually rapid motion of various Alaskan glaciers this season is due, it is believed, to earthquakes. A number of well-known scientists, now visiting in the territory, have given this as their opinion.

The glacier at Rainy Hollow, a short distance from Haines, is moving at the prodigious rate of 14 feet daily.

The thunder of the huge ice masses falling over the brink of the precipice into which the glacier discharges can be heard for miles.

The movement is the most rapid that has ever come to the attention of scientists.

An expedition under the auspices of the National Geographical society is in Alaska studying the unusual phenomena.

FELLED TREES HURT VALLEY

Story Spread Throughout California and Northwestern Fruit Districts —Cut Down Orchard Is Injuring Southern Oregon.

"Over a dozen people in Sacramento valley towns asked me whether it was true or not that orchards were being cut down in the Rogue River valley on account of blight, and told me that train passengers had reported seeing an orchard adjoining Medford cut down. The story is all along the line, and this felled orchard is doing untold damage to the country," states A. E. Powell of Medford, who has just returned from a week in California.

William Budge yesterday took through the valley on a tour of inspection some eastern acquaintances who were going to pass Medford up, having been shown the cut-down orchard as proof of the fact that orchards had to be cut down here on account of blight. They were not convinced until a trip through the orchards was made. They reported that the story was in general circulation in all orchard districts in the northwest and that train passengers spread it and confirmed it.

Many people called at the Mail Tribune office this morning, commending the paper for calling attention to the orchard and suggesting that the county court be petitioned to act, if the owners refused.
