**ORDINANCE NO. 355.**

An ordinance providing for the construction of a 6-inch lateral sewer along Dakota avenue from Peach street to Newtown street, and for the assessment of the cost thereof on the property directly benefited thereby adjacent thereto, and providing for the setting of the council to consider protests against said construction and assessment and the serving of the orders of such property with notice of the same.
