#### Accessory Possible.

The police believe that the young woman was an accessory to the murder.

Mrs. Crippen was Bella Moore, daughter of a Polish family of nobility, that fled from Poland to avoid persecution. She was born in Philadelphia and educated in the United States and Europe. She became famous as a singer owing to the remarkable range of her voice. Her first appearance was in London, where she achieved instant popularity.

Later the girl returned to Philadelphia, where she was married to Crippen. Then she discovered that she was heiress to a baronial estate in Poland and to the title of baroness. She and Crippen sailed for Europe with the intention of claiming the estate. The couple did not return to America, but set up an expensive establishment in London. They apparently were very wealthy. Mrs. Crippen was 34 years of age.

#### Advertises Her Death.

After the disappearance of Mrs. Crippen her husband declared that she had gone to America on a theatrical tour.

The police later discovered that he also advertised her death in a theatrical paper. The notice said Mrs. Crippen had died in California. The police learned today that no such death occurred at the place advertised.

The forged letter referred to by the police was one purporting to have been sent by Mrs. Crippen to the Music Hall Ladies' Guild, of which Mrs. Crippen was secretary. It was dated in February and the writer announced that she was going to America.

upon the agreement as a slap at the plan of Secretary of State Knox for internationalizing Manchurian trade.

England otherwise favors the treaty because Russia, her ally through the Anglo-Japanese, against Germany and Austria.

Germany, in spite of denial, is believed to be seeking to break the Anglo-Japanese agreement to replace it with a German-Japanese alliance. HMer object in this would be to aid

Japan in the prophesied struggle with the United States so that Germany could interfere commercially and politically in South America while the United States was busy with Japan.

Japan, in addition to the alleged German alliance, is seeking exclusive trade in the far east, and regards the United States as an intruder, particularly in the Philippines. The mikado is also said to be seeking an alliance with Turkey. It is said this is at the instigation of Russia which would use Turkey to guard the Dardanelles from the fleet of any European power seeking to attack southern Russia.

China's attitude is openly subservient, but secretly aggrieved. The Chinese realize that Manchuria will be lost to them unless all foreigners be driven out. At present China is supine under Japanese influence.

The course of the United States in this maze of diplomacy is a difficult one, and every European and Asiatic capital is watching the moves of the

#### American state department.

It is conceded here that Japan's next move will be the complete occupation of Korea and its annexation as a dependency of the mikado.
