SAN FRANCISCO, July 15.—Before Judge Lawlor today District Attorney Fickert made a motion that the case of Patrick Calhoun go over until September 1 because of the absence of "Big Jim" Gallagher, the principal witness for the prosecution. Fickert stated that he understood Gallagher is still in Vancouver, B. C., and that he does not intend to return to San Francisco.

Judge Lawlor denied the motion and set the case for July 29, at the same time citing the relatives and friends of Gallagher who have been in communication with the fugitive to appear in court on July 29 and tell what they know of his case.
