GRAFTERS PLAN NEW CONTROL

Bi-Partisan Combination to Swing Illinois Legislature Devised by Accused Bribe-Takers—File Petitions Together for Nomination.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., July 18.—That a bi-partisan alliance, formed to control the next legislature, exists between the Shurtleff-Lorimer factions of the Republican party and the Browne ring of the Democratic party was shown today, it is declared, when the secretary of state received petitions for candidates for the nominating primary to be held September 15.

The fifth man in the line of petition bearers carried petitions representing Speaker Shurtleff of the assembly and other Shurtleffites. Just in front of him stood a man carrying petitions representing the Browne faction of the Democrats. Ahead of him, second man in the line, was a man who carried a petition for the faction, of which United States Senator William Lorimer is the head.

The fact that the three men were together at the head of the line and that their petitions were filed before the other shows, politicians assert, that these factions have combined to get the men they name at the head of the nominating tickets and thereby insure election.

The names first filed are given preference in making out the ballots. The primary is to nominate state, congressional and senatorial candidates. Thousands of petitions were filed before noon.

The fact that Browne, Shurtleff and Lorimer figured in the petition filing today revives the stories of their joint control of the legislature last year, which resulted in the election of Lorimer to the senate. Lee O'Neil Browne is now under indictment for bribery in connection with the senatorial election and Lorimer's election is to be investigated by the senate at his own request.

FELIX DIAZ SAYS HE IS STILL CHIEF OF POLICE

CAN FRANCISCO, July 18.—Felix Diaz, chief of police of the City of Mexico, and nephew of President Diaz, is amazed at the rapidity with which news travels. Reports that are untrue, he believes, travel considerably faster than facts which "get there sooner or later, because they are facts."

That he had been ousted as police chief of Mexico City just previous to the late election is news to Felix. That he was charged with being an "insurrecto" against his uncle, he says, also is news.

"Neither in fact is true," he said today.

Diaz stopped off here "just to look around," en route to Mexico City from Reno, where he was present at the Jeffries-Johnson fight. He says he is just as surely the head of the Mexican police as he ever was.
