J. P. O'Brien, tailor for Daniels for Duds for the past 16 months, leaves for a visit with relatives in New York and Boston, to be gone about six weeks.

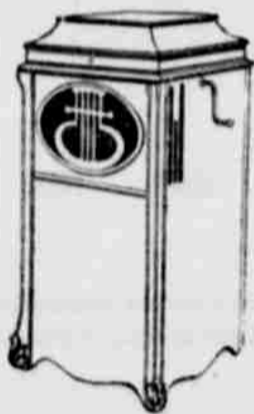

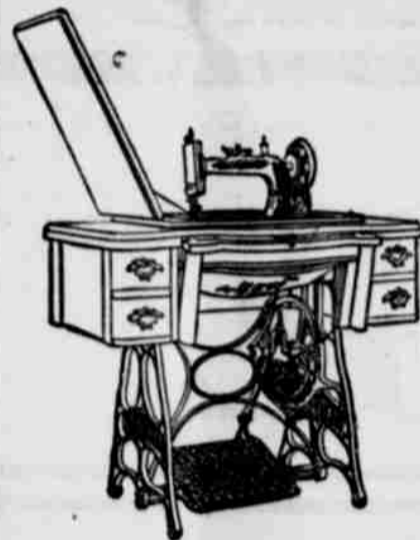
