DEATH OF JUDGE HANNA.

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under him as officers of the court graced by his judicial bearing.

In token of the confidence reposed in him and in appreciation of his long and faithful service to his state, the members of the bar presented to the judge a beautifully engraved gold watch, the presentation speech being delivered by the Hon. William M. Colvig, speaking for and in behalf of all of the lawyers of Jackson and Josephine counties.

In a short address, filled with emotion, and deeply revealing the true manliness of the speaker, Judge Hanna thanked his court officers and attorneys for their services to him, and accepted the gift, which will always remain as a true treasure to him and an heirloom to his family.

Judge H. K. Hanna was elected as district attorney for the first judicial district of the state of Oregon, comprising the counties of Jackson, Josephine, Lake and Klamath, on June 6, 1870, and served as such officer from July 1, 1870, until June 30, 1872; he was again elected to the same office on June 1, 1874; re-elected on June 5, 1876, and served until the 1st day of July, 1878.

Upon October 26, 1878, he was appointed as circuit judge of the district, and on November 4, 1878, took the oath of office before Silas J. Day, then county judge of Jackson county, Oregon. On June 7, 1880, he was elected to succeed himself, and served as circuit judge under this appointment and election from November 4, 1878, until the date of his voluntary retirement by resignation on December 31, 1883.

At the general elections held on June 6, 1892, June 6, 1898, and June 6, 1904, he was each time re-elected as circuit judge of the first district, the district at the time of each election comprising the said four counties. He served continually as such officer from July 4, 1892, until and including the 31st day of January, 1910, on which last-named date his term of office terminated with his voluntary retirement.

In the resolutions prepared at that time is found the following:

"Of him it can truthfully be said that he never at any time sought the office to which he was elected; that his candidacy each time was brought about and supported by the taxpayers of his district, irrespective of party politics; there never was a time during his long tenure of office when it was not a personal financial sacrifice for him to fill it. With his own, recognized ability as a practitioner he could easily, in the practice of the profession which he has ever honored, received much greater financial remuneration than the salary of public office, but the honor and fidelity to his trust has earned him will repay him more for his years unremitting toil than anything else than the power of man to bestow.

"Thus, as was well said by Governor Frank W. Benson, in accepting the resignation of this honored jurist, a people of the first district, time and time again, and irrespective of party politics or civil faction, have need upon his work the stamp of their approval.

"Never before, within the knowl-

edge of your committee, has any judge been faced with more perplexing questions, involving life, liberty and property, than have been in this long career presented to this judge for decision; and each time the duty, however painful, has been performed with fairness, wisdom and honest purpose.

Justice Moore of the supreme court wrote the committee as follows:

"Having learned that you are chairman of a committee appointed to prepare suitable resolutions, expressive of the esteem cherished for, the confidence reposed in and the good will entertained toward Hon. H. K. Hanna by the members of the Southern Oregon bar, I trust you will not consider it out of place for me to call your attention to the regard which the members of this court have always had for the distinguished judge, whose valuable services for the state have terminated with his resignation.

"For more than 17 years I have had frequent occasion carefully to scrutinize bills of exceptions in actions at law, and transcripts of evidence in suits in equity which have been tried by Judge Hanna. An investigation of such records necessarily leads to the conclusion that in the trial of causes he has been fair, fearless, honest and able, and has made for himself a record which, if he leaves to his children no other legacy, they may well be proud of the enduring fame which he has achieved.

"I regret to see him leave the bench which has so long been honored by his dignified appearance, his courteous bearing and his friendship for officers, jurors, witnesses, clients and attorneys who have appeared in his court.

"I sincerely wish him the rest from labor which his long and valuable services merit. If you can, without too much trouble, in a single sentence, place in your report what I have so feebly expressed, you will confer a great favor upon me. Yours very truly,

The committee then concluded its resolutions as follows:

"In these few words, our eminent chief justice has said it all. These words of praise could come from no higher authority, and the kind sentiments expressed in his letter are voiced by the entire roll of attorneys in the four counties which Judge Hanna has so well served, as well as by the taxpayers, the jurors and the witnesses, comprising as they do the citizenship of Southern Oregon.

"Judge Hanna at all times upheld the true dignity of his high station, and had at all times the highest regard for the ethics of our honored profession.

"His court proceedings were not threaded with nor made of the little technicalities, but he ever maintained that the true aim of the lawyer and court should be to promote substantial justice between man and man.

"To now follow the advice of our chief justice and write it all in a single sentence, the people of the state of Oregon say to Judge Hanna: "Well done, good and faithful servant."

UNCLE SAM HAS NEW EXPLOSIVE

World Should Not Be Startled If Government Announces Soon That New Gun, More Powerful Than Any Other, Has Been Made.

NEW YORK, July 26.—Within the next few months the world should not be startled if the United States government gives out official word that a cannon has been perfected that shoots so powerfully and so far that the heavy armament of other countries will look like mere popguns. General Fred D. Grant, who has just arrived in New York to assume command of the department of the east, says such a gun has been perfected and is now undergoing final trials at Governor's Island.

The United States, General Grant says, has had an explosive under cover for a number of years which, if fired from a gun strong enough to withstand the tremendous pressure, would do the damage now done by a dozen ordinary 12-inchers. This gun, he says, has at last been perfected. "Beyond doubt it is the most wonderful gun in the world and the explosive is the most powerful," said General Grant.

Hanna, and he signed my application for admission to the bar," stated Clarence L. Reames. "I have always entertained the most kind feelings toward him and regarded him highly as a friend and a jurist."

"I cannot express my deep regret at the death of Judge Hanna," states A. E. Reames. "He was ever faithful to his trust and I believe his mistakes were honest ones. He had been an intimate friend for years and I feel that I have suffered a great personal loss."

"For 20 years," states Gus Newbury, "Judge Hanna has been a close friend. I was clerk under him and I ever found him considerate and kind. He was a man of strong convictions and never pandered to public opinion. I can cite instances where, on the eve of election, he made decisions which he felt would bring about his defeat, yet he never faltered. I have lost a close personal friend, and I cannot express my feelings."

"I have practiced for several years before Judge Hanna," states Holbrook Withington, "and I believe in his death the bar of southern Oregon has suffered a great loss."

W. R. Coleman, county clerk, who for several years past has served as clerk of the circuit court, paid Judge Hanna a high tribute. He states that he ever found the judge a strong friend and a man who, when he once saw his duty, never hesitated in following it out.
