PORTLAND, Or., July 29.—Elizabeth, queen of Roumania (Carmen Sylva), will come to Portland probably in September. While here she will be the guest of the Better Citizenship association and will participate in a national anniversary meeting of the organization, according to announcements made by the general secretary, E. M. Rosenthal. Queen Elizabeth expects to make a tour of the United States that will take her to the principal cities of the nation. The date of her arrival in Portland has not been definitely fixed, but she is expected the latter part of September. The anniversary of the Better Citizenship association had been set for yesterday, but when word came to Rosenthal of Queen Elizabeth's coming it was instantly decided that it would be best to defer the conference until her arrival.

ROCHESTER, Minn., July 29.—An operation was performed on Eugene V. Debs, former candidate for president on the Socialist ticket, by Dr. S. Mayo at the Mayo Bros' hospital today. The nature of Debs' illness has not been given out. It is said at the hospital that the illness is not serious and that the operation was a minor one. It is said Debs will be in bed not more than three days.

ALICE IS HAPPY, THOUGH NICK IS LICKED

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 29.—Alice Roosevelt Longworth is today quite happy, despite the defeat of her husband, Congressman Nicholas Longworth, for the Republican gubernatorial nomination in Ohio. In fact, Mrs. Longworth admits she is a little happier in view of the defeat than she could have been had Longworth been victorious. Mrs. Longworth likes society at Newport, in Washington and on Long Island. Had Longworth been nominated for governor and elected, it would have been chiefly Ohio society for the Longworths. Hence she entertains no gubernatorial aspirations for her husband.

STRIKE SITUATION IS IMPROVING

No Rioting at Columbus Last Night —Three Regiments State Troops Control Situation—Believed No More Trouble Likely.

COLUMBUS, O., July 29.—Three regiments of the Ohio national guard are doing strike duty in Columbus today. Soldiers are patrolling the streets near the barbans of the Columbus Railway & Light company. The traction company will attempt to resume running cars today and the soldiers will guard the tracks. There was no violence during the night and early morning, and it is believed the presence of the troops will be sufficient to maintain order today. No cars were in operation yesterday afternoon or last night. Governor Judson Harmon is expected to arrive today. He will keep in touch with the situation and use every means in his power to prevent the recurrence of disorder.

WOMAN WHO KILLED IS EXONERATED BY JURY

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., July 29. Mrs. Daisy Fisher, wife of E. F. Fisher, a prominent business man of Oklahoma City, today stands exonerated of any crime, though she shot and instantly killed D. E. Smith of Santa Clara, Cal. According to Mrs. Fisher, Smith and she were sweethearts in Hannibal, Mo., ten years ago, when she married Fisher. Since her marriage she says Smith hounded her, imploring her to desert Fisher and go with him. On one occasion she said he threatened to shoot her. Yesterday he attempted to enter the Fisher home, when Mrs. Fisher shot him. Smith has a wife and two children in Santa Clara. When his body was searched after the shooting a revolver and a picture of Mrs. Fisher were found in his coat pocket. The coroner's jury held Mrs. Fisher blameless.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 29.—Tom Jones, Ad Wolgast's manager, is today on his way to San Francisco to confer with Jimmy Coffroth, fight promoter.
